A bill was introduced in the last California legislature by Senator Coggins to appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to fix the road from Madeline to Lakeview, but the bill was withdrawn. It was a good move if it had only been carried out, and should have been done. However, that improvement would only have made the tie that binds Lake county to California that much stronger. That is the same tie that Portland is trying to sever, and bind to that city. Keeping continually at it is the only way to accomplish anything in this line.

JULY RACES

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 24, and ending July 27, 1903. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses as follows:

Note—1st race on 4th day, race and distance to be made up on the track, July 3d.

CONDITIONS. All of the above races are free for all except the saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start in all races, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered. Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse. The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other amusement is announced for that date.
