Assessor John Blair received a letter last week from his son Tracy, formerly of this county but now of Anaconda, Montana. Tracy is a mining and civil engineer, and is employed by the Anaconda Copper Mining Co. He says this plant, which is the largest in the world, is putting up a gigantic stack to carry off the poisonous fumes and gasses from the smelter. These gasses are said to kill all stock and vegetation for 20 miles around the plant, and the company has spent more than a million dollars in the past year and a half in damages. To avoid this a huge brick chimney 390 feet high is being put up, and in addition a huge flue 1/2 of a mile long and 160 feet wide extending from the plant to the stack, is being built. The total cost will be 1 1/2 million dollars. This smelting and refining plant employs 3,000 men, and they work on 8 hour shifts. Tracy says he is doing well.
