Earnest Brown and Jim Handley returned Tuesday from a fishing sprint to Sprague river, where they secured a large invoice of up-to-date fish stories. J. W. Stevenson, who has a ranch in Drews Valley, was in town Monday. He returned to Lake County last Fall after an absence in California of ten years.
