As will be seen in another column, acting Secretary of the Interior Thos. Ryan, has refused to grant a rehearing of the Secretary's recent decision in the case of J. L. Morrow et al. v. The State of Oregon and The Warner Valley Stock Company. The settlers however, are quite adverse to giving up their claims after so many years of struggle and litigation, and as long as there is a ray of hope or straw to cling to, they feel it their duty to do whatever in their power they can to retain the land they have so long made their homes. While The Examiner has no prediction to make, yet we feel, that should this decision prove to be final—which it appears to be—and there is no other recourse, the settlers should not lose all. If they are compelled to give up their homes and absent themselves from the land, they should be liberally recompensed for their years of labor in improving the land that they have claimed as homes. The Warner Valley Stock Company, in whose favor the recent decision has been made, should offer, as a matter of just desert, to fully compensate each and every settler the full value of their improvements on the land in question. This will be only justice to them and they should demand it as a final settlement, when they are satisfied that they cannot retain the land.

Are the Republicans of Lake County going to turn out on election day, and give a rousing majority for Binger Hermann, or are they going to be indifferent and remain at home?
