THAT FRICTION.

The declaration of President Roosevelt that he wishes every voter who believes in the principles of the party and wishes well for the administration to vote for Hermann should certainly set at rest all uneasiness as to Mr. Hermann's recognized position among the powers that be. The trifling friction that existed between him and the Secretary of the Interior, and which the democrats have so ungently magnified into a mountain, has dwindled into a mole hill of the least significance. The "family quarrel," as Mr. Reames has dubbed it, has failed to materialize except in the imagination of the baloon element of the democracy, inflated by Hearst which also has been effectually punctured by the President.

To any one with ordinary intelligence it is simply absurd to think for a moment that a difference of opinion between a cabinet officer and one of his subordinates should carry extreme unjust on the management of national affairs, nor in the safe adjudication of matters before the department of the Interior.

The tribunal of the Secretary of the Interior and that of the commissioner of the General Land office is defined almost to a degree of remoteness. Of course appeals be, as from a court of inferior jurisdiction to that of a superior jurisdiction, but Mr. Hermann as commissioner, has certainly been sustained oftener than any of his predecessors in his position as the records will disclose. The only danger of defeat for Mr. Hermann,—and that is not to be thought of—is the too sure thing on the part of republicans, commonly called apathy. Oregon will not dim her lustre as a republican state by sending a democrat to congress, but will do herself grand in reinstating a capable, tried and efficient exponent of her wants in the person of Binger Hermann whose successful record heretofore in every capacity, is unblemished and undefiled.

A great deal of merriment was created the other day when some fellow who had imbibed the flowing bowl too freely the night before, causing him to sleep quite late next day. When he awoke and looked out of the window his astonishment was so great on seeing the ground white with snow, that he was heard to exclaim with an oath, "my—have I slept all summer?"

Brattain Equals a Coast Record.

The California Track record for three and a half furlongs was equalled at Sacramento on the 12th, when Mellen's gray gelding E. M. Brattain and Coffey's Queen T. ran neck and neck to the wire in forty-one seconds, Brattain winning out by the smallest kind of a nose. As Coffey is not satisfied with the result, the possibility is that the two will be sent away in a special race next Saturday.

Three and one-half furlongs, three-year-olds and upwards—E. M. Brattain, 109 (Burk) 3 to 5, first; Queen T., 110 (Ashley) 6 to 5, second; Lizzie Rice, 95 (Henderson) 5 to 1, third. Time, 0:41. Amasa, Coal Oil Johnny and Adieu also ran.

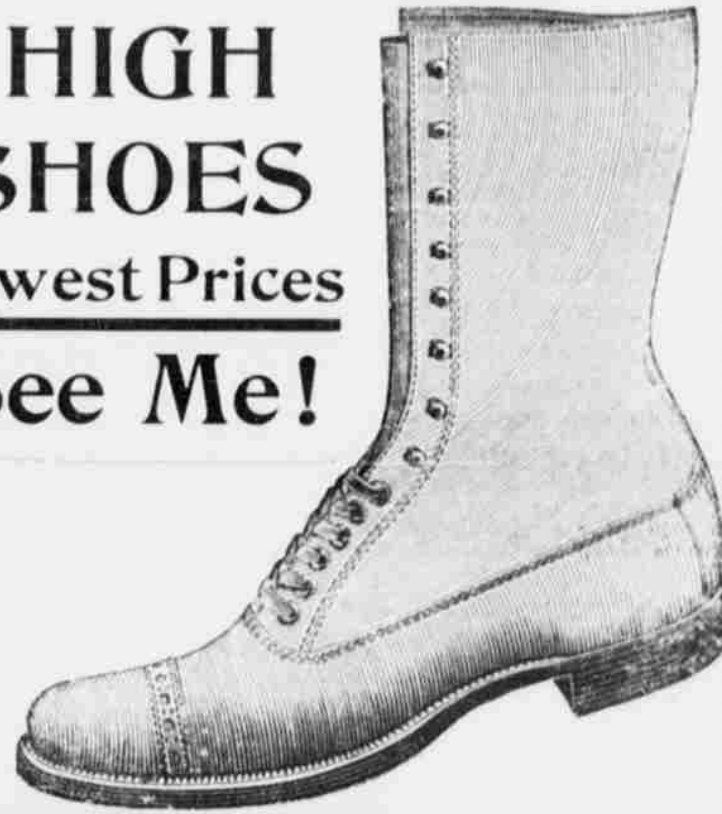
