Won First Prize.

Mrs. R. S. Boyd, of 324 Guerrero St. San Francisco, Cal., daughter of our townsmen, J. N. Watson, won first prize in the S. F. Examiner's Receipt contest of April 19. The prize was a 120 piece dinner set, worth about \$50. Here is the prize-winning receipt:

STUFFED KIDNEYS—Split 2 dozen fresh lamb kidneys through the center, salt well and set aside for one hour, then pour boiling water over them and leave a minute to loosen skin. Remove skin and wipe dry. Prepare a dressing of 2 cups dry breadcrumbs, 2 tablespoons chopped onions, 1/2 cup chopped parsley, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, a dash of cayenne and salt to taste. Moisten with a little stock. With a sharp knife remove tough substance in center of kidneys, put in the stuffing and skewer each two halves firmly together with wooden toothpicks. Place in a buttered pan and pour a cup of water over. Roast in a hot oven, basting frequently until done according to taste. Remove from pan, thicken gravy with a tablespoon of flour, season with salt and pepper, add 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms and a bay leaf, simmer a few moments and pour over the kidneys, from which the toothpicks have been carefully withdrawn.—Chewanuck Post.
