A WARNING TO REPUBLICANS.

Ample evidence is at hand to convince the public that the Democratic candidate does not rely on what may be styled democratic principles to land him in the congressional chair, but his reliance is in apathy of Republican voters in the political contest being waged, says the Tidings.

A confidential circular is being mailed to Democrats in the district and more particularly in Jackson county, asking the Democrats of the different precincts to get out the Democratic vote on election day. A quotation from the letter may be of interest—"I wish to call your attention to a few facts which may be of service to you. There is a great apathy and dissatisfaction among the Republicans, growing out of the nomination of so unpopular a man as Binger Herman. At this election there will be no local candidate to get out the votes. The vote in the district will be at least 10,000 short. The shortage in the vote alone will put a good Democrat and a Jackson county man in Congress, if we can only get out the vote. Please try and interview personally every Democrat in your precinct before election and make them all see the necessity of coming to the polls at this election."

A reliance on a full Democratic vote and a shortage in the Republican vote is the only hope which Mr. Reames, the Democratic candidate, has in the ensuing election. Republicans of Jackson county should see to it on election day that there is a full vote at the polls—that no Republican should be absent on that day. A reference to the above quotation from the headquarters of the Democracy of Jackson county plainly shows an expected shortage in Republican votes at the coming election. Republicans should not remain away from the polls on election day, but should be there on that day and anticipate Mr. Reame's expected election due to Republican apathy.

It is said that John Farson, a Chicago millionaire, has offered \$1,000,000 to the servant who will stay in his family till he dies, who loves her vocation, who is a diplomat, who knows better than to discuss family affairs with the other servants, who is always dignified, who is a good nurse, a good cook, a dressmaker, and who never suks. Such a luxury would easily be worth the money to a man who can afford it. But angels are rare on earth, and even at \$1,000,000 apiece Mr. Farson may experience great difficulty in catching any.

The question is, do the Republicans of Lake county, especially the stockmen—the sheep men particularly—believe in protection or free trade? The people who have received the greatest benefit from a protective tariff should know, from what political party is responsible for their good fortune. Now, if you do believe in protection, and you derive more direct benefit from it than other people do, who follow other lines of business, don't you think, and in fact know, that you are in duty bound to not only turn out on election day, but assist every man in the county who is so inclined to vote for Binger Hermann for Congress. He represents all that the word protection signifies, and his opponent represents all that free trade signifies. Do you want to indorse—by staying at home—a man who is opposed to your principals? Don't let it be said that Mr. Hermann was beaten because his friends stayed at home taking care of their prospering flocks, all caused by the party in power, that Mr. Hermann represents.

Reames made many friends in Lake county while he was attending to his duty as prosecuting attorney, and no doubt some Republicans thought favorably of him for congress, but his insinuations in his letters that he expected them to not only vote for him, but to work for him in a quiet way or any way by fair or foul means, is too much for a people who have sufficient sense to understand his threat. In other words he means that if you vote for him you are about right, but if you don't, you are—well, something that don't look in print.

What a lot of muss "love" makes in the newspapers! Pick up any paper and you will read of elopements, love stricken people dying together, murder, suicide, stealing, all sorts of crimes—in the name of love. Women run off and forget their husbands and children; husbands give up everything in a reckless manner. Love keeps the lawyer, judge, coroner and undertaker busy. If you catch it, make arrangements for something serious.

It really seems that Grover Cleveland is casting his eyes longingly for the Democratic nomination. He has been bobbing up too persistently of late to form any other conclusion. He is now patting the South on the back in indorsement of their views on the race problem.
