Those letters Mr. Reames wrote to the Democrats of Lake County, was the silliest piece of work any politician ever did. It made many intelligent democrats exceedingly wroth, and will no doubt cost Mr. Reames many votes.

President Roosevelt's endorsement of Hon. Binger Hermann was very enthusiastic and convincing. In making short speeches from the platform of his car through Oregon, the President and Mr. Hermann stood side by side.

Ten feet of snow was reported from Coumts, Montana, near the international boundary on the 20th, and the thermometer is ranging from four to six degrees below zero. Traffic on the Great Northern is seriously interfered with. A conservative estimate places the loss of stock at about \$2,000,000, and the number of head of stock lost is figured at about 30,000. This loss will be swelled by the ruination of the fruit crop throughout Northern Montana, which it is understood is a total failure.

Has Mr. Reames made the apology and explanation demanded in the Lakeview Herald two weeks ago? The Herald accused Mr. Reames of saying in his many letters to Democrats, that Dr. Daly was not supporting him for Congress, and that paper further says: "We feel that it is not only unjust, but it is a positive insult to the intelligence and loyalty of the Democrats of Lake county." No apology or explanation has been forthcoming, so it is understood that Mr. Reames' insult to his party will stand, thereby inviting the Democrats to support Binger Hermann.

Mr. Reames, the letter writer, could probably write Theodore Roosevelt as follows: President Roosevelt, (Confidential) I am a son-in-law of the late Congressman Tongue; if you can assist me in this election I will stand by you and show you that while I pretend to be a democrat, I am really unsettled as to my political principles, and would be unable in any way to interfere with the policy of the majority in congress, in fact I would be a mere figurehead so far as my legislation is concerned. What I want most is the honor of being represented in congress. I hope you can help me out in some way. Don't show this to anyone.—Eugene Register.

If you vote for Binger Hermann you indorse the present administration and the prosperous times the whole country has been enjoying for more than a half a dozen years. If you vote for Reames, it's a direct slap at both. Vote right.

Completely routed in their false charges against Hermann and his relations to the general land office, the democratic managers are driven to the necessity of distorting Oregon events of 30 years ago, to make it appear that Binger, when only 29 years of age, committed some political indiscretions, says the Eugene Register. Hermann at 29 never made as complete a chump of himself (although he was then immature and undeveloped) as has Reames, who is much older than was Hermann at that time, but who has made himself the laughing stock of the district by the school-boy letters he has written to men of sense and sound judgement.

The Medford Mail, in its last issue, takes The Examiner to task in a mild way, for publishing the famous (?) speech (not) made by Mr. Reames at Champoug, on May 2d, the occasion being the 60th anniversary of the establishment of territorial government in Oregon, without giving the Mail credit for the article. The reason that Mr. Reames didn't make the speech, was because he was not there, but his intentions were good, and he sent publishers the speech in advance. The Mail says: "We don't know whether to get mad because no credit was given or feel complimented because the article was thought worthy of being parloined. Finally we have concluded to forgive Bro. Beach because he knows a good thing when he sees it and is always ready to publish good Republican campaign matter."

As The Mail has forgiven us the oversight, we will promise not to do it again, providing Mr. Reames does not make any more such speeches.

President Invites Hermann to Ride.

All doubt about Hermann's harmonious relations with the President have been set at rest. The first announcement of Mr. Roosevelt's attitude, as printed a week ago, was assailed by many Democrats as false. But when the president invited Mr. Hermann to ride with him from Salem to Portland, he gave evidence that that announcement was true. Democrats are very much chagrined. Some of them have remarked that the President was playing very poor judgement to mix up in the local politics of the state.

Republican supporters of Hermann estimate that Hermann will be elected by between 2500 and 4000 plurality. They figure on a light vote, both in the Democratic and in the Republican camp. They base their argument on the following syllogism: Furnish carried the First District against Chamberlain by over 100 plurality; but Hermann is stronger than Furnish, and Reames is weaker than Chamberlain. Therefore, Hermann's election is coclosure. They say that, even if some Republicans vote for Reames, as many Democrats will vote for Hermann, especially in the Coast counties. And if a large number of Republicans stay away from the polls a large number of Democrats will do the same. Therefore, since Tongue last June defeated his Democratic opponent, Weatherford, by 7300 votes, Hermann will be elected by at least 3000 votes.

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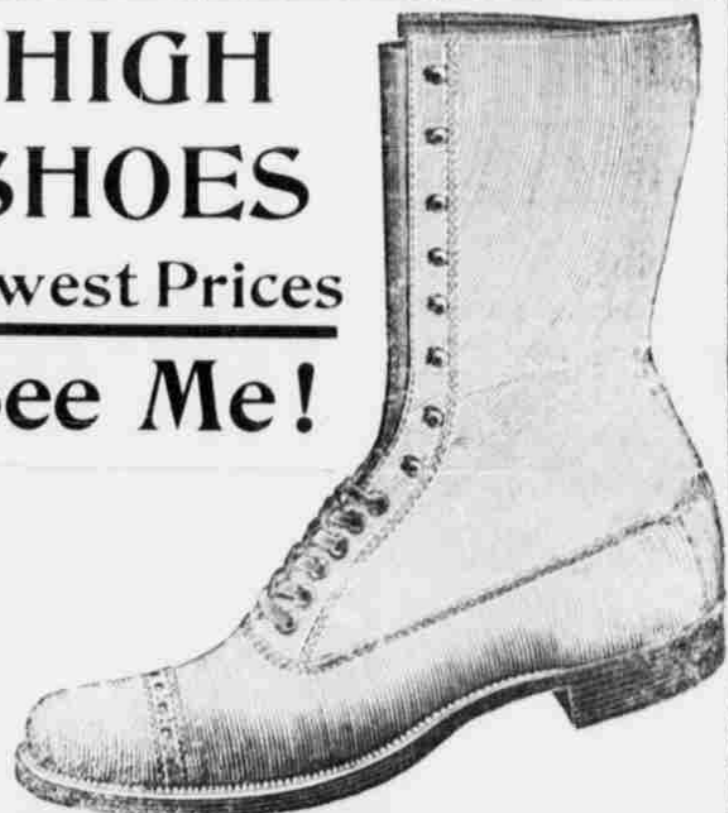
