Lakeview School Closes Successful Term.

Last Friday was the last day of the Lakeview School, and examination consumed the principal part of the last week. The term was quite successful as the high average is shown in the examinations. Twenty-five pupils have passed the State Eighth Grade final examination, and hold diplomas certifying that fact. This is the first year that any Lakeview pupils have successfully passed this examination.

Superintendent Willits received word from the president of the Medford Business College offering a free six months scholarship in that college to the pupil of Lake county who stood highest in the State 8th grade final examination. The little daughter of Virgil Conn, Vera, of Paisley, having the highest average standing, is entitled to the scholarship.

The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d, and ending July 7th, 1903. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses as follows:

2d Race	3/4 mile dash \$150
FOURTH DAY - JULY 7th.	
1st Race	\$200
2d Race	one mile \$200

NOTE.—1st race on 4th day, race and distance to be made up on the track, July 3d.

CONDITIONS.
All of the above races are free for all except the saddle race, which is for Lake county horses. Four to enter and three to start in all races, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered. Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood Horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to second horse.
The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races, in the event of not filling, or to change the date of the last day's event to the following day in case any other amusement is announced for that date. No money paid without a contest.
