The Lake County Agricultural Association will give four days racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing July 2d, and ending July 7th, 1903. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses as follows:

 (two-year-olds)
 2d Race 1/2 mile dash free for all \$150
SECOND DAY - JULY 3d
 1st Race 3/8 mile heats \$175
 2d Race 1 mile dash \$150
 3d Race Vaquero race for Lake County horses, to be rode with vaquero saddles and Spanish bit bridles and to be rode by vaqueros. Distance 600 yds. \$75
THIRD DAY - JULY 6th.
 1st Race 1/2 mile heats \$200
 2d Race 1/2 mile dash \$150
FOURTH DAY - JULY 7th.
 1st Race \$200
 2d Race one mile \$200
