

Veteran Driver Stricken.

Robert Garrett, the veteran manager and driver of the Ashland-Klamath Falls stage line, was stricken with an attack of what his physician pronounces to be cerebro-spinal meningitis. Tuesday morning, while driving his stage between Pokegama and Hart's station, says the *Titlins*. There was one passenger on the stage at the time, and Mr. Garrett pluckily piloted the stage safely to Soda Springs, when he became unconscious. He was brought to his home in Ashland in a carriage, unconscious continuing over yesterday and until this morning, when he regained sensibility and is somewhat better. Hopes are entertained of his complete recovery.

Nearly a Million For Oregon.

Commissioner Richards, of the General Land Office, has had prepared a statement giving the exact amount of funds set apart for reclamation of arid lands under irrigation act of 1902. It shows a total of \$7,539,338 for the fiscal years 1901 and 1902, and of this Oregon is apportioned \$910,961. The total for 1901 was \$3,114,861, and for 1902 \$4,565,516. The returns on the sale of public lands for the first three quarters of the present fiscal year indicate that the receipts will be about equal to the two preceding years, so that by the first of next July the irrigation fund in the treasury Department will amount to about \$15,000,000.

Seen Monster Lion.

White Jas. Ivory, foreman of the X. L. and Leo McMenam, were riding on the plateau after stock last Friday, a huge California lion passed within forty yards in front of them. It was a very rocky place where he was seen, almost impossible for a horse to travel, or perhaps Jim would have given him a circle with his rope, in the endeavor to get the XL iron on him. The tracks of this beast have been seen frequently between the X L ranch and the Huffman place, and all who have ever run across the animal say that he looks like a monster. It was only a mile west of the X L ranch that he was seen by Ivory and McMenam.

A Big Dredger.
