

THOMAS McGRATH.

Thomas McGrath died in Lakeview, Saturday evening, June 6th at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Alex Fitzpatrick. The end was not unexpected as he had been in feeble health for a long time, and the past few months he was nearly helpless as a result of an operation which partially paralyzed his left side. The past few weeks that he was in town he was kept from being broken during his long suffering only by his unceasing energy and will power.

It will be remembered that a year ago Mr. McGrath went to San Francisco to have a growth resembling a cancer, removed from his neck. The operation was not successful and he returned to the city again last September for a similar operation. He returned home, but his trouble continued, and he grew worse each day, with increased pain and suffering until the end came.

Mr. McGrath came to Lake County several years ago from Shasta valley, where he was engaged in the mercantile business. He purchased the Dan Snelling ranch at Cogswell creek, and has since resided there with his family.

Mr. McGrath was 59 years and 6 months old at the time of his death, and besides a loving wife leaves three sons and two daughters to mourn his demise: George, Harry, Bernard, Alice and Mrs. Alex Fitzpatrick.

The funeral took place Monday at 10:30 o'clock, the remains being interred in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. A large concourse followed the remains to the grave. Rev. Smythe preached the funeral sermon at the house.
