GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN WRITES

Last week J. L. Morrow and L. D. Frakes returned from Salem, where they went to interview Governor Chamberlain in regard to the Warner Swamp land cases, and interest that gentleman in their behalf. Last week The Examiner published the fact that their case had been brought before the State Land Board, and that they were represented by U. S. District Attorney Hall. Messrs. Morrow and Frakes think that there is a good chance that the state will refuse to accept the land as swamp from the government, as the Governor is greatly interested in their case. The Governor's interest is shown in the following telegram and letter to the Secretary of the Interior:

STATE OF OREGON

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Salem, June 25th, 1903.

Honorable Secretary of Interior, Washington, D. C.,

Sir—My attention has but recently been called to a controversy of long standing between settlers under the Federal Laws in Townships 39 and 40, Ranges 24 and 25 East, Lakeview Land District, Oregon, and the Warner Valley Stock Co., claiming to deraign title from the state under the Swamp Land Grant. Since my attention has been called to it I have not had an opportunity to inquire into the merits of this controversy, but propose to give it my very careful attention and ascertain if possible which claimant ought to prevail.

I have just wired you as follows: "Please withhold issuing of patents to any lands in Townships thirty-nine and forty, Ranges twenty-four and five East, Lakeview Land District, Oregon, letter by this mail," which I now confirm.

The State Land Board will consider the claim of the settlers one week from today, and you will in due course be advised what further action, if any, the State will take in the premises. I will appreciate it very much, therefore, if you will in the mean time withhold the issuance of patents to any of the claimants.
