The American Protective Tariff League of New York is early in the field for the campaign of 1904. Realizing that the percentage of new voters may prove to be sufficient to turn the scale in several States, the League has mailed to its members and connections inquiry cards asking names and addresses of young men who will, next year, cast their first votes at a Presidential election. Replies to these cards are coming in by the hundreds in every mail, and the League is rapidly accumulating an immense list of names to which it will send literature of the sort calculated to inform young electors as to the merits of the questions dividing the two political parties.

A pioneer newspaper of Oregon was the Jacksonville Sentinel. It was started in the early '50s, and had a career of about twenty-five years. W. G. T. Vault, an original character, in the early history of Oregon, was its first editor. B. F. Dowell was long time its editor and publisher. For a number of years B. M. C. Gault, now editor of the Hillsboro Independent and member of the legislature for Washington County, directed it. It ceased publication several years ago; but there is a new Jacksonville Sentinel started recently by Charles Meserve. It is a four-page weekly, carries proofs of industry, and revives memories of the old Jacksonville Sentinel.—Oregonian.

The Chronicle, Call and Examiner, morning papers of San Francisco, and the Bulletin and Post, evening papers, give notice that, in consequence of the increased cost of white paper and other expenses of publication, they are obliged to advance their subscription rates. The morning papers advance their rates from 65 cents to 75 cents a month; the evening papers in proportion. Subscription rates of San Francisco papers have always been too low, says the Oregonian. The city is not large enough to justify the low prices. Charges of the afternoon papers of Portland are too low, both for subscriptions and advertisements. In San Francisco all advertising rates are much higher than in Portland.

To reproduce parts of the City of Cairo, Egypt.

To reproduce that part of the City of Constantinople, Turkey, called "Stamboul."

To operate a Ceylon tea garden.

To exhibit naval maneuvers and sea fights by means of fleets of miniature war ships.

"Mysterious Asia"—to reproduce representative parts of India, Ceylon, Persia and Burmah.

"Old St. Louis"—to reproduce the City of St. Louis as it existed in 1803.

The "Fire Fighting Exhibition"—to show the most modern fire fighting methods, and the most effective means of saving life and property from destruction by fire.

"Trip to Siberia"—to reproduce Russian scenes as though seen from a Russian railway train.

"Under and Over the Sea"—to conduct an illusory trip to Paris by submarine boat, and an illusory return by means of an airship.

"The Irish Village."

"Galveston Flood"—to operate a scenograph to show the Galveston flood and the new Galveston with its impregnable sea-wall.

"Trip to the North Pole."

"Battle Abbey"—to exhibit cyclonic representations of the principal battles in the history of the United States.

To exhibit deep sea diving.

The "Magic Whirlpool"—a boat ride on the brink of a real waterfall, and a ride through a whirlpool.

To operate a scenic railway.

The "Streets of Seville"—representative scenes from Spain.
