#### Funds for Heppner.

Mayor Whitworth last week announced that there would a meeting of citizens in the court house Saturday night to devise ways and means to raise funds to assist the sufferers at the Heppner flood. The meeting was a failure, as there were not enough people there to transact business, and nothing was done. Very few, if any towns in Oregon have failed to promptly respond to the appeal for help from the stricken mountain town, where nearly 300 people lost their lives and as many more were rendered homeless. The citizens of Lakeview should feel a sense of shame and humiliation in the non action of so laudable a purpose at the request of the mayor.

Two of Lakeview's benevolent orders made quick response to the cry for help, and have already sent generous donations to Heppner. The A. O. E. W. Lodge donated from its general fund \$25, and in addition \$42 was collected from the members, making \$67 altogether. The W. O. W. Lodge donated \$75 without any additions. E. N. Jurgens, Clerk of the Camp, W. O. W. received word from Heppner Monday that there was plenty of funds on hand for all purposes, and if the Camp had not already sent money, not to do so, and if they had, not to send any more. It would appear from this that money had been pouring in from all directions and in large quantities far beyond all expectations. While the money thus sent will clothe and reduce the misery of the distressed, to a certain extent, a helping hand for those who have lost their savings waters. The giving of a few dollars is as little as anyone should think of doing for those who have lost their family, their home and their business. Imagine oneself in their position, how sad it is to even think about it.

longs to her. The Nevada road runs for a considerable distance through a poor country, and will not strike the best territory until it gets over the line into the rich Lakeview district. That it will reach this district is a certainty, for it would not have been built nearly 200 miles to terminate within a few miles of a district which was vastly superior in natural resources to that through which it is already built.

With an alien road into the Lakeview district and drawing from it traffic which rightfully should seek an outlet by way of the Oregon road, it will be a question of a short time only until it will push on up to the vast timber region of the Deschutes. The lumber industry alone in that region will support a large population, and their trade will go in the direction taken by their products. With such a situation confronting us, it is of the utmost importance that no time be lost in getting the extension of the Columbia Southern started. If Mr. Harriman is acting in good faith toward Portland, he will either build the extension or will lend his moral support and sanction to parties who will build it, and build it quickly, as soon as he makes a final decision. He will also stop that feeder of his trunk line across the continent from coming any farther into territory which Nature made tributary to Portland. If the extension of the Columbia Southern can be stayed off a year or two more, the Nevada road will be far enough into central Oregon to render it unnecessary to build from this direction. Portland would then have extreme difficulty in raising the money for a second road where one was sufficient.

Perhaps Mr. Harriman wants a little more time in which to consider the advisability of building into Central Oregon from Shandy. While that time is running out, the Nevada, California & Oregon will continue to shorten the distance between Reno and Lakeview. The notions of the great railroad magnate who has a grip on Portland's business interests will be watched with more than ordinary interest within the next few weeks. He is now up against a genuine test of sincerity in his alleged intention for Portland.

#### Nothing But Money Goes.

G. E. Wardwell, U. S. Commissioner for this place received orders from the land office at Lakeview to the effect that coin would have to be sent in from that date for proofs and application on lands, as they had been instructed to take no more checks, drafts or money orders in payment, says the Silver Lake Oregonian. Similar orders have been sent to other commissioners. This order will cause considerable inconvenience to the commissioners, as the amount of money it will be necessary for them to handle will cause a great deal of anxiety for its safe delivery to the land office. Again, the parties coming from a distance to make proof had it more convenient to carry checks, but they will now have to bring the coin, as nothing else will be accepted.

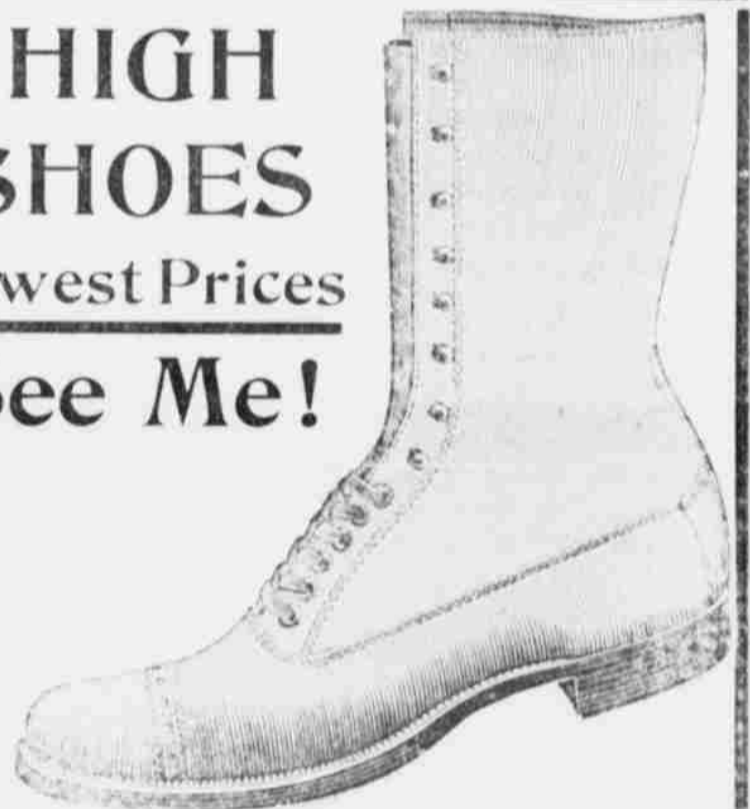
