

**World's Fair Notes.**

Wisconsin has decided on a \$20,000 structure for her State bidding at the World's Fair.

Japan has appropriated 800,000 yen or about \$400,000 in American money, for her exhibit at the World's Fair.

Russia will make an exhibit in keeping with her importance as a nation. Work on the Russian Building will begin in July.

Automobile chairs will be one mode of transportation at the World's Fair. Their speed will be limited to three miles an hour.

Wireless telegraphy and color photography will be mostly featured in the exhibit of the government patent office at the World's Fair.

The Arizona State building at the World's Fair will cost \$25,000, and in style will be a combination of Spanish and Moorish architecture.

The Exposition management has officially passed on the bicycle problem. Wheels may be led into the grounds, but no riding will be permitted.

Egypt has accepted the invitation to participate in the World's Fair and the Khedive has appointed H. E. Lawford, Commissioner to the Exposition.

King Edward has suggested that Sir Thomas Lipton serve as guide to the Prince and Princess of Wales when they attend the World's Fair in 1904.

The National Electric Light Association will hold its 1904 meeting in St. Louis during "Electrical Congress week" at the World's Fair, September 12-17.

The contract for the Kansas building was awarded to S. F. Bealer an Ottawa, Kan., architect. The building will cost \$29,745, and will be finished by December 1, 1903.

The Mayor of Philadelphia has appointed a committee of representative citizens to arrange for the city's commercial and industrial interest at the World's Fair, St. Louis.

The prizes in the Live Stock Department at the World's Fair will amount to \$250,000. This sum is more than the aggregate of the prizes given at previous international exhibitions.

A model baker shop in which electricity will operate all of the machinery and furnish the heat for the baking, will be an interesting feature in the Palace of Agriculture at the World's Fair.

The applications of British exhibitors for space at the World's Fair at St. Louis are coming in very rapidly since Col. C. J. Watson, Secretary of the British Commission, returned to London. His flying trip to the United States promises to awaken a much keener interest in the exhibition.

**Special Round Trip Rates.**

Between June 4th and August 26th The Illinois Central will sell round trip tickets from Oregon and Washington points, to Chicago, Cairo, Memphis, and New Orleans at Greatly Reduced Rates. 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**Fate of Timber Laws.**

A general impression prevails that the next session of Congress will repeal the act providing for timber and stone entries of public land. If this is correct, the result of repeal is likely to be the placing of all timber and stone land in about the same status as if the land were included in a reserve and held rigidly under government control. Those forecasting repeal of the present law believe that when the government disposes of such land under the provisions to follow, a sale of the timber will be made according to a stumpage valuation.

Time is largely wasted in conjecturing what will be done or may be done, when as much doubt hazes the horizon as envelopes the present subject. The government seems bent upon preserving a major portion of the standing timber. How it is to be done matters little, if it is the irrevocable will of those in power to set aside undeveloped tracts for the purpose. But the voice of the people should be heard in the land commanding that none of the strangling red tape frequent in government work, nor any political favoritism so devastating of public interests in apportioning land grants, swamp land, etc., be permitted in the care and sale of public timber land.—Sumpter American.

**Joe Lane's Treaty Tree.**

It is a matter for regret that the landmarks of early Oregon history have not been better preserved. Features whose interest would increase with the years have been suffering to be destroyed through ignorance or indifference. In 1853, there was some trouble with the Rogue River Indians, though the war did not occur until two years later. In 1853, General "Joe" Lane, whose name is inseparably connected with the history of Oregon, made a treaty with the Rogue River Indians on a spot which is now included within the present city limits of Grants Pass. He met the Indians under a black oak tree on Rogue river, just above the "White Rocks." Old timers are still able to point out the stump of this tree, but the tree itself has been cut down and sawed into stove wood in these latter years, probably, by some man who never heard of Joe Lane.

**Modocs Returning to Klamath.**

The migration of the Modoc Indians from the Indian Territory where they were removed after the close of the Modoc war by the government, to their old homes on the Klamath reservation, has begun, says the Tidings. A few days ago there arrived at Ager, enroute to Klamath, Chas. Hood, Henry Hudson, Sam Ball, Dan Clinton and John Spicer, all Modoc Indians with their families. The men have acquired valuable lands in the Territory during their long stay there which they still possess, but they hope to have their children participate in the allotment of lands at their old homes on the Klamath reservation. The return of these Modocs is in the nature of a visit to their old hunting grounds but it is probable that they will remain permanently.
