Harry Hull St. Clair, a holder of a Columbia scholarship in anthropology, will spend some time in Oregon among the Indians to study their languages, manners and traditions. He will prepare a report for the United States government.

Ambassador Meyer is receiving the unflattering attention of the daily press in Rome for the alleged recklessness with which he speeds his automobile through the streets. Il Popolo Romano suggests that the ambassador persists in his course because, being unable to read Italian, he does not know what the papers are saying about him.

John Gollmar, formerly editor of a Serbian newspaper, but expelled from that country for exposing the bogus baby scheme of Queen Draga, has been residing in Janesville, Wis., for some years past. Since the tragedy at Belgrade he has received intelligence that his sentence will be revoked and intends to return to Serbia at an early date.

Professor Albert Van der Nallen, who is at the head of an engineering school in San Francisco, has been created a Chevalier del Ordre de Leopold by the king of the Belgians. During the past seven years Professor Van der Nallen went five times to Europe, studied the latest progress of the sciences under the most eminent men, and brought the results with him to California.

## More Land Withdrawn.

The Commissioner of the General Land Office has withdrawn from general entry 272,000 acres of land in the Susanville Land district in Northern California, which is to be included in the Warner mountains forest reserve.

## Government Maps for Sale.

The Examiner is in receipt of a circular letter from the Department of the Interior, in which it says:

Attention is called to the fact that a wall map of the United States, prepared under the direction of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, has been issued for sale by the Department. In addition to the usual map features on this are shown the several acquisitions of territory upon this continent by the Government of the United States, by clearly defined boundaries, as determined by the latest investigations, all military, naval, Indian, forest, and timber reservations, private land claims, and the location of all United States Land Offices and offices of the United States Surveyors-General. Along its lower border are small maps of Cuba, Porto Rico, Pine Island, the Hawaiian Group, Guam, the Philippines, and the Tutuila Group of the Samoan Islands. This map is about 5 by 7 feet in size, mounted on muslin and attached to rollers ready for immediate use, and is sold for 80 cents per copy.

The Department also publishes separate maps of the several States and Territories in which public lands of the United States are located. These separate maps are unmounted and about 2 by 3 feet in size (excepting those of Alaska, California and Florida, which are about twice this size), and are sold at 42 cents per sheet. The law permits the sale of only one copy to an individual, but to schools and other institutions as many copies can be furnished as may be desired for separate buildings or departments. Maps sold by the Department are sent by registered mail free to purchasers. All remittances in payment for maps should be by draft or postal money order made payable to the order of the Financial Clerk, Department of the Interior.
