MAN OF NERVE WHO REPRESENTS US IN VENEZUELA.

How He Quelled the Spanish Mob in Barcelona—A Man From Chicago. The Consul's Unknown Guard of Cuban Patriots.

Herbert Wolcott Bowen, United States minister to Venezuela, on whose good judgment so much depended when the allies descended on the republic, is peculiarly fitted by training, experience and temperament for handling the delicate questions that arose in the emergency.

For twelve years Mr. Bowen has represented Uncle Sam in the diplomatic service, and on several occasions he has been called upon to display his mettle. For one thing, he is a trained diplomat. Indeed he was educated with an idea of entering the diplomatic service.

Just before the Spanish-American war broke out Mr. Bowen was serving as consul general at Barcelona, and it was due to his personal bravery that he escaped bodily injury on several occasions. Several times mobs of excited Spaniards gathered before the consulate to wreak vengeance on the hated Americans. Each time they were balked by Mr. Bowen's nerve and courage.

The most serious of these was when a crowd of fully 10,000 enraged men

and in other points of vantage, stood on guard until the danger was over. Mr. Bowen is a native of New York and a son of the late Henry C. Bowen, for many years editor and proprietor of the New York Independent.

In personal appearance he is impressive. He is over six feet high and carries himself erectly. He wears a heavy grayish mustache that adds to his determined aspect. He is a poet as well as a fighter and is the author of a textbook on international law which is a standard. Such is the man, now in the prime of life, who has represented Uncle Sam in two trying emergencies.
