

World's Fair Notes St. Louis, Mo.

The Liberty Bell will rest in the center of the rotunda of the Pennsylvania building.

A feature of Wyoming's exhibit at the World's Fair will be a large collection of colored photographs of Wyoming scenes.

The Irish Department of Agriculture will make a special exhibit of Irish industries.

The seventh congress of the North American Skat League will be held at the Fair.

A locomotive testing laboratory will be a feature in the Transportation building.

A dog show will be a feature of the Live Stock exhibit.

California Day at the World's Fair will be September 9, the 54th anniversary of the admission of California to the Union.

A topographical map of the state of Alabama will form a part of that state's exhibit.

Denmark has officially accepted the invitation to participate in the World's Fair, and William Arup has been appointed commissioner.

The contract for the Ohio State building has been let to the Smith & Eastman Contracting Co. The cost is slightly under \$32,000.

The Smithsonian taxidermist, George B. Turner, is preparing a 16-foot giraffe for exhibition in the Government building.

Every country in South America will participate in the World's Fair. Chile, the last to accept, contemplates an appropriation of 225,000 pesos.

Governor Peabody of Colorado has appointed Sam Wood of Denver, special commissioner, to collect exhibits for the Swedish department of the state's exhibits.

A prominent English poultry breeder will make a large display of Old English Game Fowls and Dorkings in the poultry exhibit.

An old hand fire engine, with which Louisville fires were fought before the steam apparatus came into existence, will be brought to the World's Fair by the Louisville Veteran Volunteer Fireman Association, which will visit the Fair in a body.

A mammoth watch built for the occasion, on such a large scale that people may walk around in it, among the moving wheels, will be on exhibition. Visitors will thus be able to study the mechanism of a watch without the aid of a glass.

The Indiana Commission to the World's Fair has adopted the plans of Wing & Mahurin, Ft. Wayne architects for the Indiana building at the Exposition. The structure will be in the style of the French Renaissance, with huge Corinthian columns at the entrances. The building will be more of a place of rest and pleasure for Indiana visitors at the Fair than an exhibit hall.

The largest tree in Oregon was felled recently to be sent as a curiosity to the World's Fair. It was the Aberdeen Spruce, and stood nearly 300 feet high, 40 feet around and 118 feet from the ground to the first limb. Its age is calculated at 400 years, being a good sized tree when Columbus discovered the land that was afterward called America.

The native army of the Philippines will be represented at the World's Fair next year. Two or three companies each of the scouts and constabulary with the constabulary band will attend. The best drilled and smartest looking men will be selected to make up the companies which will show the Americans the character of the police protection of the Eastern possessions.

A mammoth loaf of bread, six hundred times the size of a regular five cent loaf, and in the making of

which, an entire barrel of flour will be used, will be seen in Mississippi's exhibit at the World's Fair. Harry Mansfield of Moss Point will be the creator, and has ordered the construction of an especial bake oven, designed by himself for the baking of this giant loaf.

A collection of Continental currency owned by E. G. Vaughan, of Richmond, Ind., will be seen at the World's Fair. It consists of sixty-one pieces, ranging in denomination from one-sixth of a dollar to seventy dollars. The total value is \$1,022.83. Mr. Vaughan has had the collection since 1840.

Guide Boards Or No Pay.

If the law were strictly followed no Supervisor could draw his salary until he had erected guideboards wherever roads unite or cross, yet it is remarked by everyone who travels in the country that there are very few such boards in evidence. The law on the subject is section 30 of the latest edition of Oregon road laws and reads as follows:

Every supervisor shall erect and keep up at the forks of every highway and every crossing of public roads within his road district a guide or finger-board, containing an inscription in legible letters directing the way and specifying the distance to the next town or public place situated on each road respectively; provided, that the road supervisors shall not be paid after submitting their reports to the County court until they have shown to the satisfaction of the court that the provisions of this section have been complied with.
