Was Promoted Then Dismissed.

Last Thursday a dispatch was received at the Lakeview Land Office suspending clerk Max Whittlesey. It was a great surprise to him as well as his many friends here. The charge according to a dispatch to the Oregonian from Washington, is for furnishing speculators and others, copies of township plats and other records prepared by him during office hours, for which he received compensation, which he diverted to his own use; also is said to have prepared entry applications for a number of men during office hours. This is according to Inspector Linners' report, who was in Lakeview a few weeks ago.

Mr. Whittlesey's friends refuse to believe the charge is true, and will not accuse him until he is given a hearing. He has been out of town for a few days, and it is not known what his defense will be, but it is understood he will try to clear himself. Mr. Whittlesey has borne a first-class reputation since he came to Lakeview, and is well known as an honest good hearted fellow and a very rapid and efficient clerk. He came here from Portland two years ago, and has made many friends during his residence here.

In speaking of the matter, the Oregonian says: "Max Whittlesey is well known in Portland. The city was his home for years, and none can be found to utter a word against his uprightness nor firmness of character. It is believed here that if he has violated the law the offence was due to a misunderstanding, and not to any conscious wrongdoing."

In a late issue the Oregonian says: "The report, published yesterday, of charges brought against Max Whittlesey, clerk in the Land Office at Lakeview, was a great surprise to his friends here, as his record in this city was good. The allegations, as printed, were shown to Register A. S. Drosser, Receiver G. W. Bibbe and ex-Receiver William Galloway, of the Oregon City Land Office. These gentlemen concurred in the opinion that the aforesaid charges are trivial in nature, implying at worst a technical infraction of the civil service and laying Mr. Whittlesey liable only to suspension or dismissal from the service. His offense is not criminal, indelible, nor does it constitute a graft in the dishonorable sense of that word. He simply did clerical work for outsiders in unoccupied intervals. This would have been all right out of office hours, and that it did not interfere with his efficiency is proved by the fact that he was promoted on July 1 of this year. It is further thought likely that Mr. Whittlesey's superiors must have been cognizant of his extra work, since entry applications must be sworn to before either the Register or the Receiver. It will be recalled that the resignation of Surveyor-General Meldrum was precluded by exactly similar charges, brought against Clerk Palmer, who has since been reinstated.
