Bought What He Could Not Grab.
The Post of San Francisco says that Jesse D. Carr has succeeded in buying out the last independent settler on Tule Lake on the California and Oregon Line and is now preparing to consummate the biggest land deal ever made on this coast, by selling 300,000 acres to a Scotch-English syndicate. Carr, it will be remembered had countless thousands of acres of government land fenced in as an immense stock range for years resisting all efforts on the part of small settlers to hold locations there. When the pressure became too great the United States Marshal was ordered to level the fences, and the people of that section were looking for a small war when the attempt should be made, as Carr has hordes of cowboys ready to respond to his slightest command. The energetic old land grabber however, was too shrewd to lock horns with Uncle Sam and when the Marshal's forces arrived on their fence breaking mission, Carr's men joined them and helped in the leveling process.

A copy of approved list No. 70, consisting of 5615.78 acres in Warner Valley, including all the land in controversy between the settlers and the Warner Valley Stock Company, except those pre-emption claims the settlers are now trying to prove title to, has been received at the land office and placed on file.

Indications point to a very short wheat crop in Lake and Klamath counties in Oregon, and Modoc county, Cal. Flour will be a scarce commodity next spring. The barley crop in Lake county, will be as good and probably better than it was last year. The hay crop that is now being cut, is very short in most places.

The State Land Board has made an order directing the clerk of the Board to notify all persons holding certificates of sale of school land upon which there is due \$50 or less, that they must pay the balance and take deeds from the state. The purpose of this act is to clear up the records and render the land subject to taxation.
