

The Crater Lake Excursion.

Ashland Tidings

Will G. Steel was in Ashland July 28th in the interest of the forthcoming excursion to Crater Lake, August 4th to 18th. A number of distinguished people will join the excursion, including Senator Fulton, Governor Chamberlain and probably Senator Mitchell, besides others of less note, and Mr. Steel is arranging for transportation for the party here and at Medford. Mr. Steel is a Crater Lake enthusiast. He is very anxious to see a steam launch put on the lake by next season, also a hotel at the lake, and has taken steps for the organization of a popular corporation to be known as the Crater Lake Improvement Association, with a capital stock of \$5000, in shares of \$1 each. A steam launch with a capacity of 50 people can be launched on the lake. It is estimated for \$2500, and will likely form a profitable investment.

The season's excursion will leave the railroad at Medford for the lake returning via Ashland.

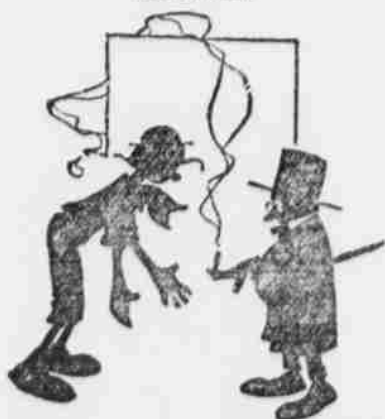
The mortality from the toy pistol is appalling, and the death from it, which is by lockjaw, is horrible. In Chicago in one July those dying from this cause numbered 60 and in another 24. In New York city three consecutive Fourths of July yielded 98 such deaths. That the tetanus bacillus which causes lockjaw is not present in the powder or wad of the toy pistol cartridge has been shown by Wells of Chicago, who examined 200 of them; the Boston health officers, who examined 350, and army officers, who tested 675. Therefore the microbes of the disease are on the skin and are driven into the wound made by the pistol. That they are on the hands of the jollyfying boy is not surprising, for their spores abound in many soils, and especially about stables. This germ is harmless while exposed to the air, but multiplies and rapidly produces its virulent poison when given warmth and moisture, where air is excluded. On this account all accidents from exploding powder should be disinfected by a doctor and should not be wrapped up.

A woman in Usher Town, Africa, on the night of the 18th, gave birth to six living babies, five boys and one girl. The next day the town was in confusion, both Europeans and natives rushed to see them. The same woman gave birth to four babies in 1895. President Roosevelt should have this family immediately imported to the United States to help him out against race suicide.

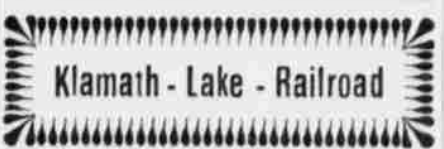
