It is planned to inaugurate the new institution in the slums along the East river.

Sir Moses Ezekiel, the famous Cincinnati sculptor, now a resident of Rome, has given to the Virginia military institute at Lexington an effective and artistic monument. It

is called "Virginia Mourning Her Dead," has been erected on the institute grounds and commemorates the heroism of the cadets who fell at the battle of Newmarket, Va., May 15, 1864. The sculptor was himself among these Confederate cadets and his roommate, Thomas Jefferson, a great grandson of the author of the Declaration of Independence, fell in that battle.

Big Timber Deal.

Twelve thousand and eight hundred acres of yellow pine timber, lying along the Walker range in Klamath and Lake Counties, were sold last week by individual holders to C. W. Cudick & Co., of Albany.

\$800 per quarter section. It is estimated that the tract will cut something in excess of 100,000,000 feet of yellow and sugar pine.

Most of this timber has been owned by private individuals for a year or more and 12 months ago it was said that the standing value was \$1,000 per quarter section. It is generally conceded that the price paid by the Albany firm is far beneath the present value of the tract, but those who held claims in the vicinity of the first purchases disposed of them because the belief is prevalent that no higher price will be paid for timber in that region during the next few years, or until a railroad movement is decided upon.
