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Protest Against Reserve.

At a meeting of the Roseburg Board of Trade Monday night of last week it was voted to make a protest against the withdrawal of Government land in Southern Oregon.

This action is occasioned by the announcement that fifty more townships in the Roseburg Land District have been withdrawn from entry, and it is believed for the purpose of adding them to the great Cascade Forest Reserve. Should this be done, it will displace hundreds of settlers and entrymen now located thereon and materially retard the industrial development of this portion of the state.

The secretary was instructed to invite other Boards of Trade and similar organizations of this state to join in a general protest against such withdrawal of lands, copies of such protests to be addressed to President Roosevelt, Secretary Hitchcock and the United States Senators and Representatives from Oregon.

Gen Geo. H. Burton

Gen. Geo. H. Burton, inspector general of the United States army with headquarters at Washington D. C., was on Sunday afternoon's north bound train and made many inquiries after old pioneers and the progress of southern Oregon says the Ashland Record. General Burton is well remembered by nearly everybody who lived in this country and took any interest in its affairs in the '70s and '80s. He was in command at Fort Klamath as Captain of the 21st Infantry and cut quite a figure in the Modoc war of 1872 which was brought to a close by the surrender and hanging of Captain Jack and his associates at Fort Klamath. General Burton was also in command at Fort Klamath from 1880 to 1884 and constructed the old military telegraph line to Fort Klamath from Ashland which was also extended to Ft. Bidwell. This line was sold at auction by the government some 15 years ago and was bid in by Ashland parties who sold the line, except from Ashland to Klamath Falls, to ranchmen who used the wire for baling hay and the poles for rail fencing. This line between Ashland and Klamath Falls was used for commercial purposes until last year when it was sold to the Midway Telephone Co., who tore it down and built a telephone line covering Klamath county points.
