which was brought to a close by the surrender and banging of Captain Jack and his associates at Fort Klamath. General Burton was also in command at Fort Klamath from 1880 to 1884 and constructed the old military telegraph line to Fort Klamath from Ashland which was also extended to Ft. Bidwell. This line was sold at auction by the government some 15 years ago and was bid in by Ashland parties who sold the line, except from Ashland to Klamath Falls, to ranchmen who used the wire for baling hay and the poles for rail fencing. This line between Ashland and Klamath Falls was used for commercial purposes until lastyear when it was sold to the Midway Telephone Co., who tore it down and built a telephone line covering Klamath county points.
