A feature of Iowa's Dairy exhibit at the St. Louis world's fair will be a statue in butter of John Stewart, the pioneer creamery man of that state. It will be life size and will be kept frozen in a glass case throughout the exposition.

Miss Helen Gould, who has liberally endowed the Young Men's Christian associations in a number of cities in Indiana along the line of Wabash railroad, has now arranged to place a number of libraries in the buildings which she has helped to build.

United States Senator Allen G. Thurman of Ohio did not have money enough when he died to pay his debts, and it is deemed necessary to sell the old homestead on which he lived for the last twenty years of his life and where his son, Allen W. Thurman, now resides to raise funds to meet them.

The funds in the San Francisco city treasury have been counted, and the treasurer, John E. McDougal, found to be a defaulter to the amount of one cent. It is due to Mr. McDougal to say that he tendered the amount of the deficit to the committee of the city council but the members refused to accept it.

Professor Irwin Rautenstrauch of Washington University, who formerly lived in Sedalia, Kansas, has asked the courts to change his name. Nobody in this country has ever been able to pronounce it right and the professor has got tired of being called "Rottenstraw," which was conferred upon him in his school days.

John S. Johnson of Fair Haven, Conn., to whom reference was recently made as "the last survivor of Commodore Perry's famous expedition to Japan in 1853," must, it appears, share his distinction with James Gilland, who is now in his 73d year. Mr. Gilland is a native of Altoona, Pennsylvania, and was with Commodore Perry previous to and through the whole expedition.

If the expenses are 10 per cent without advertising, make them 12 or 14 per cent with advertising and double or quadruple the business.—Men's Outfitter.

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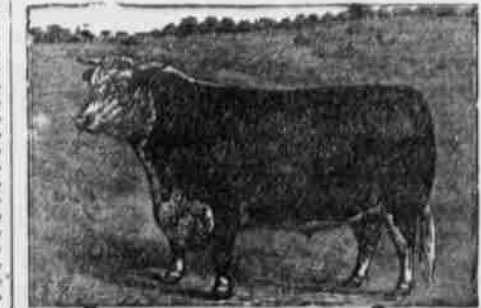
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
