

LIVING IN PARIS.

A Sample Which May or May Not Be Considered Extravagant.

Though my wife and I are not gormands, we both like good things, and, if not great eaters, we both have fair appetites. In the morning when we rise we take an early breakfast, tea and bread and butter; at noon, a hors d'œuvre, meat, vegetables, dessert and coffee; at 5 o'clock, tea and cakes; at 8 o'clock, soup, fish, meat, vegetables, sweets and dessert. Food is very dear in France, first on account of the great number of middlemen who intervene between the producer and purchaser, next because certain articles—coffee, sugar, etc.—are charged with very heavy duties. Feeding is the heaviest expense of our household. It costs us \$72 a month, divided as follows: Baker and pastry cook, \$8; various meats, \$20; fish, \$6; groceries, \$12; fruit and vegetables, \$9; milk and cream, \$6; a quarter barrel of Bordeaux wine (about seventy-five bottles), \$8; two or three bottles of liqueurs, \$3. To this may be added \$8 for the extra cost of a dinner that I give very month to some intimate friends, says a writer in the Architectural Record.

On an average lighting costs us \$4 a month; heating, \$4; washing, \$8. A woman help comes for two hours every day to help the servant and costs \$4 a month. We also pay \$2 a month to the floor polisher and \$2 to a circulating library. That makes in all an additional \$20 a month. There remains then \$53.60 per month. My wife takes \$20 for her personal expenses—dressmaker, milliner, shoemaker, etc. I keep the same for my tailor, bootmaker, shirt maker, cigars, etc. With the \$13.60 which remains I take my wife to the theater once a month, I occasionally take a carriage drive with her or visit art exhibitions, and I present her now and again with flowers, a piece of music or some other trifling gift.

WOMAN AND FASHION

Afternoon Gown.

Here is illustrated a dainty afternoon gown designed by one of the leading couturiers. It is made of white and trimmed with the new punta tarata and many small tucks. This new trimming is lavishly used on the skirt and

forms a yoke in the bodice. The tops of the sleeves are made of this trimming combined with the tucks, and below the elbow they are made very full and gathered into a cuff of the punta tarata. The hat worn with this costume is of white chip simply adorned with large white ostrich plumes.—Chicago News.

Waists of the Hour.

While waists with plain backs are seen, the rule is to trim, tuck and shirr them almost as much as at the front. It is quite important that the drooping shoulder effect be produced, and there are many schemes by which this is done. If one has a high shouldered figure the dressmaker will cut the armhole of the lining high up in its natural place, so as not to hinder the wearer's movements, and the material itself she will cut about three inches lower down to secure the right effect. Epaulet effects are also very popular and are shown in many shapes and guises. A linen or lawn waist may have them inserted with the fagot or Mexican stitch and extend over the top of the sleeve, which is cut to accommodate it.

The Audobon society, in North Carolina, has eight branches in eight towns and cities, including Raleigh and Wilmington. It has 280 members, who pay \$5 each per year. The society employs men on the coast at \$4 and \$5 each a month to look after violations of the law against killing birds.

Professor G. T. Kemp of the University of Illinois is now conducting experiments at Cripple Creek, Col., in regard to the effect of a high altitude on persons who have poor blood. He is being assisted by five students of the Champaign College, who have one of their fingers punctured each day and from two to four drops of blood taken out and carefully examined.

It is said that between the island of Madagascar and the coast of India there are 16,000 islands, only 600 of which are inhabited. In most of these islands a man can live and support his family in luxury without working more than 25 days in the year. In fact, on some of the islands he need not work at all, as nature provides the food, and no clothes are required.

The most popular of the private postal cards sold in Canada are those which represent Great Britain and the United States as the most devoted of friends and brothers, or, rather, sisters. One such card represents the Goddess of Liberty and Britannia side by side, with the eagle and the lion, and with the two shields together. Above them are the two flags in brilliant colors, and the words "Anglo-Saxon. One aim, one goal," and below, "Gloia Mundi."

By order of the United States government the embargo on New England wool, which has been in force since last December, has been unofficially lifted. Consequent upon the removal of the embargo on the New England products, permits for wool shipped from western points Massachusetts ports becomes unnecessary. The wool men are inclined to look upon the extreme caution of the government in the matter of wool as somewhat of a farce. When the foot and mouth disease was at its worst in December, all Massachusetts and Vermont firms were forbidden to ship home clipped wool outside the limits of the state. This prohibition was especially annoying in that it tied up not only the comparatively small wool clip of New England, but also all the Western clip shipped through the state.
