Mrs. Clara Barton has not renewed her labors on behalf of the Red Cross society, notwithstanding the recent efforts to depose her from the presidency. She is formulating plans for a new and large fund of probably \$1,000,000 for the extension of the work.

The 27th child of William C. Pettifore of Jersey City has been named Alice Roosevelt. Her father admires the strenuous president, who has so much to say against race suicide. Pettifore is 51 years old. All his children have been born within 30 years. There are four pairs of twins. Twenty of the children are living. The eldest is 29 years old.

The dedication of a monument to be erected at the birth place of President Chester Alan Arthur in Fairfield, Vt., by the state of Vermont, will occur some time during the month of Oct., the precise day having not yet been fixed. The speakers will be Albert E. Lincoln of Chicago, President Arthur's secretary of war, ex-Senator William W. Chandler of New Hampshire, his secretary of the navy, and others. The arrangements are in the hands of ex-Governor W. W. Stickney.

Chance For Big Reward.

An association of California vineyardists has been formed, to be known as the American Grape Acid Association, for the purpose of solving the problem of the production of cream of tartar from California grapes says the Call. Any person who can find out this secret will be paid \$25,000, so says Andrew Sharpboro. The association accordingly has deposited guarantees to pay the award.

Mr. Sharpboro says that if any one should be successful in discovering the process for the utilization of California grapes to produce tartaric acid on a commercial basis such a process would be of inestimable value to California and to the United States. The United States is a very large importer of grape acids which are material for cream of tartar despite the fact that California is a very large producer of grapes. The present value of tartaric acid wholesale is 31 cents a pound.
