Mrs. A. D. T. Whitney, the writer of books for girls, recently celebrated her seventy-ninth birthday on Milton Hill, near Boston, Mass.

Professor Theodore Mommson, now nearly 86 years of age, continues his contributions to ancient Roman antiquities excavated at Baalbec.

C. M. Malloy of Chattanooga, Tenn., after five failures with flying machines, has gone to San Francisco, where he will make a sixth attempt.

Prosecution of two female Eddies for practicing medicine without a license has been commenced by the State Board of Medical Registration of Indiana.

In the absence of horses both a plow and a mower were used tied behind his automobile by Mr. Raser, an Ohio farmer. The machine was geared too fast to give the best results.

The German states give to one university more than the British government allows to all the universities and university colleges in England, Ireland and Scotland together.

The American investment in religious and educational institutions in Turkey is \$6,500,000 and more than \$20,000,000 has been spent in mission work covering nearly a century.

On June 30 last there were 57 warships of 319,700 tons displacement in the course of construction in England. Of this number 12 vessels were being in royal dockyards and 45 in private yards.

There will be no more intoxicating liquors sold at the National Capitol. The bill prohibiting it slipped through the Senate last winter and the President was not considered enough to veto it.

Mrs. Charles J. Holman, who died at her home at Attleboro, Mass., recently, was the widow of David E. Holman, who was secret to Marquis de Lafayette at Boston upon the occasion of Bunker Hill monument.

Frank James, the former outlaw, who made an interesting career for himself in crime, has determined to take up the work of a farmer during the remainder of his days. At present James is starring with Cole Younger, another outlaw, in a wild west show in Kansas. James is 60 years old. He says he has had his share of excitement, and hereafter will be known as "Frank James, farmer."

General Fred D. Grant, now in command of the department of Texas, makes the latest argument in favor of the army canteen. In his last report to the war department he maintains that the canteen is "a protected circle into which no vice or degradation can intrude," and he declares that to close the doors of the soldier's garrison club and to send him out into the haunts of iniquity and vice run by immoral vultures who, degraded themselves, set up no standard of morality, but, breaking down all barriers of restraint, invite and induce soldiers to join in all sorts of depravity and infamy, is a wrong to the soldier as well as a wrong to the community in which the soldier is located."

The French architect Philippe Merlat was commissioned by the shah of Persia to build a pavilion for his majesty on the exposition grounds in 1900, but he has, it is said, never been able to collect a franc in payment. The French courts being unable to aid him, he has appealed to the Hague peace tribunal to help him in obtaining a settlement of his claim.
