

Question of Timber Claims Settled.

The following letter published in the Yreka Journal, replying to inquiries as to the exact ruling of the land department relative to timber claims, is self-explanatory:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 12th, 1903.

Mr. CHAS. W. STROTHER, Lawyer, Yreka, Calif.

DEAR SIR: Referring to your letter of 29th, ult., relative to the suspension of your timber and stone entry, you are advised that if you make a satisfactory showing, that your entry was made for your own use and benefit, and there is nothing more to impeach your good faith than the mere fact that you made the entry as an investment, with intent to sell the land at some future indefinite time, and in this manner realize a profit on the money invested, this office holds that such an entry is not made in violation of law, and should be passed to patent.

More Railroad Rumors.

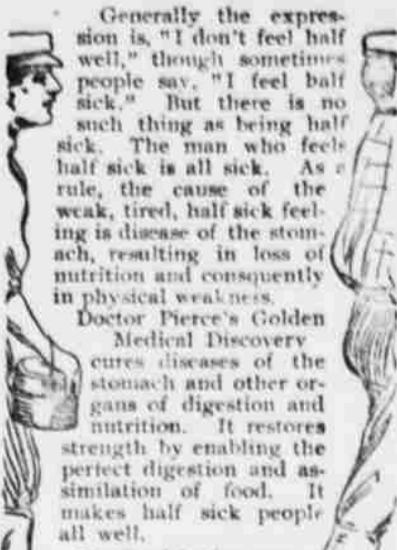
Rumors are again in the air of the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern over the Cascades. It is reported that four sawmills east of the mountains are engaged in turning out ties for the proposed extension, and that they are being piled along the route to be traversed for miles. It is also reported that some of the officials of the road have been making investments along the route. The roadbed was several years ago graded fourteen miles east of the crest of the Cascades, and the short tunnel necessary near the summit was half completed at the time. Everything is being put in readiness, it is said for advance at short notice. All of which seems almost too good to be true. But it is the natural thing for the owners of that road to do. It would bring them a vast amount of new business, and probably pay largely on the investment. And it would be of great benefit of that country, and the central Willamette valley.—Statesman.

Prospect is Dark.

The extent to which land is being withdrawn from settlement in Oregon by the creation of forest reserves is so great as to become alarming and the future of the state has a black shadow over it. For one-fourth of the entire area of Oregon to be set apart for an indefinite period and withdrawn from use for grazing or agriculture is not a pleasant prospect for a loyal Oregonian to behold. If these reserves were confined within reasonable limits no complaint would be made, but the indiscriminate manner in which the secretary of the interior is slashing into our public domain is causing great injustice to the people of the state. One of the best object lessons is the reduction of its livestock industry. The secretary appears to think that every spot on the map marked mountainous should be set aside as a heavily timbered, snow preserving, water source tract; the people of the state to the bow wows.—Pendleton Tribune.

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So much cork is now used in manufacture of linoleum and in shipbuilding that the protection of cork trees has become a matter of prime importance. Italy is taking steps to this end in Sicily and Sardinia, where there are large cork forests, those of Calabria having been nearly destroyed in the making of charcoal. It is said that Spain is showing a like interest in protecting these trees, as the manufacture of cork is a large industry there. Only a few years ago the exportation of wine bottle corks from that country amounted to about \$5,000,000 annually.

It is proposed to reserve a national park near the eastern coast of Porto Rico. A representative of the United States bureau of forestry has visited Porto Rico and finds a great forest, preserving a natural water supply.

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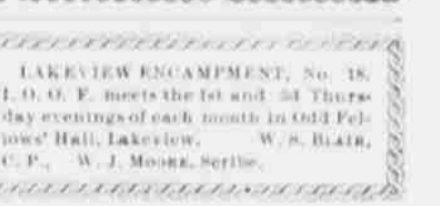
