The Lake County Agricultural Association will give Four Days Racing on their track in Lakeview, commencing on November 4th and ending on November 7th, 1903. The sum of \$1400 will be distributed in purses as follows:

FIRST DAY, NOV. 4th.

1st Race, 3/8 mile and repeat \$200
2d Race, 3/8 mile dash 150

SECOND DAY, NOV. 5th.

1st Race, 1/2 mile dash, \$150
2d Race, 1 mile dash, 175

THIRD DAY, NOV. 6th.

1st Race, 1/2 mile and repeat \$200
2d Race, 3/8 mile dash 175

FOURTH DAY, NOV. 7th.

1st Race, 3/8 mile and repeat \$175
2d Race, amount and distance to be named at the track Nov. 5th.

CONDITIONS.

All of the above races are free for all, four to enter and three to start but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than four by reducing the purse in proportion to the number of horses entered.

Entries to close the evening before the race. The Pacific Coast Blood horse Association rules to govern all running races. Entrance fee ten per cent of purse. Money to be divided as follows: 70 per cent to the first horse and 30 per cent to the second horse.
