

World's Fair Notes.

September 20, 1904, will be Fraternity Day at the World's Fair.

The singers of the Brooklyn (N. Y.) Union will give several concerts at the World's Fair next year.

The statute of Pease, the crowning figure of the Louisiana Purchase Monument at the World's Fair has been put in place.

The Morocco pavilion will be situated near the California building and the reproduction of the city of Jerusalem.

C. L. Hilleary, Assistant General Passenger Agent of the Big Four Route, has been appointed Traffic Manager for the World's Fair and has assumed the duties of the position.

In the Palace of Transportation the Louisiana commission will show models of the boats of the past and present used on the lower Mississippi river and of ocean steamers and pleasure yachts.

Fifty two car loads of material for the Philippine buildings, comprising 2,300 tons, have arrived at the Exposition grounds. The majority of the cars contain large bamboo poles for the construction of the native villages.

The first car load of exhibits from Oklahoma, has arrived at the Exposition grounds. The consignment consisted of apples, which were immediately placed in cold storage.

The observation tower that has been a feature of the Tower Hotel at Niagara Falls since 1893, is being taken down and the material will be used by the American Wireless Telegraph Company in building its tower at the World's Fair.

"Hoo-Hoo Day" will be September 9, 1904. Work on the "House of Hoo-Hoo" will begin soon. The "Hoo-Hoos" are an organization of men engaged in the lumber trade and kindred industries. It is designed to build a club house at the World's Fair for the comfort of the members when they visit the Exposition.

The jubilee gifts of the late Pope Leo XIII will be exhibited at the World's Fair. W. E. Curtis, the author and correspondent, now making a tour of Europe, is in Rome to arrange for the transfer of the treasures from the Vatican to St. Louis. The intrinsic value of the gifts is incalculable, nearly every crowned head in Europe being represented in the list of donors.

The first annual convention of the Oregon State Good Roads association was held last week. Recommendations for a state appropriation of \$100,000 for sample roads throughout the State were made. A resolution was passed favoring the employment of convicts in highway construction. Salem was selected as the next place of meeting. Vice-presidents (with the exception of Marion and Josephine counties) were selected by naming the county judges. H. B. Thilsten was elected vice-president for Marion, and W. H. Hampton for Josephine.
