

No Tax Levy For 1903.

The Supreme Court handed down a decision at noon Saturday, declaring that there can be no levy of taxes in Oregon for 1903, under the existing laws. The decree recently made by Judge Cleland of the circuit court, enjoining the officials of Multnomah county from proceeding with the levy is affiirmed. The effect will be to deprive every city, county and district in Oregon, as well as the state itself, of all revenues from taxation for the current year unless the legislature is convened in special session and a remedial law is passed.

Dan Malow drove Dr. Steiner over to Warner first of the week behind his matched team of Sinfax colts. They made record time.


Rev. S. V. Warren, the new M. E. pastor appointed for Paisley, passed through Lakeview Monday with his family for his new home.
