John Smart, Ben Loosley and Ben Stout came down from Fort Klamath Saturday with 2900 sheep. Mr. Smart was having these sheep taken to the Lava Beds for the winter but while in town he sold them to Klum and McKendree for \$2.25 a head.—Klamath Republican.

Senator Mitchell has introduced a bill in Congress appropriating \$2,125,000 for the Lewis & Clark Fair in Portland in 1905. We would like to make an amendment to this bill, making Lake County a part of Oregon commercially. If the bill passes as amended we could attend the Fair like true Oregonians.

Cattle owners are not well pleased with the twist that has been given to the cattle market this Fall. To take a reduced price on occasion is not so all-fired bad, but not to be able to sell good stock at all is quite another thing. Consumers are paying as much at the counter as ever, and presumably they are taking as much out of the markets as usual. With everything else high and cattle low it looks like there might be a "squeeze" somewhere.—Burns News.

They were blockaded by the big snow storm and they thought for awhile that they would have to "hole up" for the winter with the bear they went after, but didn't find. The Klamath Express says: Well, there is mud again, and on the long stretch of mountain road twist here and Ashland it isn't going to dry up again until the coming of "good old summer time." We've a railroad 32 miles from town on which runs trains which come and go as per schedule. Let's cut out about 40 miles of mud and snow drift and have the mail pouches delivered from the train at Pokegema.

By a process of special cultivation Farmer Brown, of the State Insane Asylum Farm, has developed a monster cucumber, measuring over three feet in circumference, the long way. He expects to take the seed, and, by improved processes of cross fertilization, grow a cucumber three feet long for the Lewis & Clark Exposition that will open the eyes of the whole world as to the possibilities of the pickle and cucumber business in Oregon. This cucumber will be pickled in alcohol and taken by President Jefferson Myers to the St. Louis Exposition, and may be sent to some of the great Expositions of Europe and Australia.—Salem Journal.

**Is Nearly Electrocuted.**

Perry Stanley, the electrician, had another narrow escape from being electrocuted in the Lakeview electric light plant. Last Thursday night in piling in some wood to run the engine for the night, Perry had hung a lamp, attached to long covered wires, on the outside so as to aid him in seeing where to get the wood. Previously, the wires had been made bare in two places for experimental purposes, and when he went to put the lamp back inside he accidentally grasped the bare places on the wire. Having gloves on, that were wet from handling the wood, he did not at once feel the shock, and not until he took a step or two did he feel it. Then he could not let go, and at once his arms and legs became paralyzed. He could not move, and as his body began to sway, he wished to fall to the ground, thinking perhaps it would break his hold, but instead he leaned over against the wood pile. In this position he was discovered by Jim Maxwell, who was assisting him, and at once started to take hold of Perry to shake him loose. Realizing that Jim would meet the same fate as himself, Perry worked up steam enough to yell, having been rendered speechless on the start. This startled Jim and he proceeded to shut off the engine, but thinking this would be too slow he pulled the switch, which at once shut off the electric current. Had no assistance been near at hand when it happened, Perry would have been dead within a very short time. Perry was alright the next day, his muscles were extremely sore however. He says he will be more careful in the future.

**Planted Catfish.**

George C. Duncan arrived here Thursday evening with something over 400 catfish which he brought from the Chewaucan. "Uncle George" had a hard time to catch and bring the fish but was determined not to be out done. This was his fourth attempt to get them and he lost only a few in the long drive across the desert and through the rocks. Opinions differ as to the advisability of planting catfish in Silver River, some claiming they would kill all the other fish in the stream. People who claim to know say this is not the case, however. "Uncle" George says he is positive they do not destroy other fish as trout and other kinds are seen and caught in the Chewaucan where there are thousands of catfish.

Klamath county has a cow elk. The animal was seen by Mr. McKendree, a sheep herder, a couple of weeks ago, while with his sheep on the east side of Horsefly mountain. It is thought to be a stray from somewhere north. It is believed also that a buck elk accompanies her. Messrs Gerber and McKendree are very much interested in the animal's protection and have asked that they be appointed special game wardens that they may the better deal with the person who would make meat of this among the most beautiful and noble animals.—Express.
