Horace Mann, former publisher of the late Medford Enquirer, has started the Oroville Journal in California.

A new China wash house was fitted up in the old Magilton tin shop last week, and was to be opened this week, but numerous citizens protested, and the Chinamen were persuaded to desist. No joints like that are wanted on Main street.

The Ashland cannery has closed its season's work having put up 15 tons of Bartlett pears, 21 tons of peaches, 19 tons of string beans and seven tons of black berries. The average number of hands employed during the four months run was from 40 to 50. —Ashland Record.

Geo. Boydston came in from the desert east of Warner Monday, where he has his sheep. Geo. says that grass is several inches high out there, and that if good weather prevails, it will continue to grow. The sheep men are all quite jubilant over the recent rain storm and think the prospects very bright for next year.

The storm period passed Lake county last Monday, and Tuesday morning until noon a heavy fog prevailed in Goose Lake Valley. Since then the sun has been shining bright and warm. The amount of precipitation since the 1st of November is 4.95, or nearly 5 inches. This is an unprecedented amount for this time of the year.

The young ladies are twins and look so much alike that they could trade schools and no one would be the wiser.

The Shasta Courier says Hon. W. A. Richards, Commissioner of the General Land Office at Washington, accompanied by his two daughters, spent last week visiting his brother, A. C. Richards of the Tower House, near French Gulch in that county, who has been superintending the Camdem toll road interests. Commissioner Richards was formerly Governor of Wyoming.

Many timber land claimants who are advertised to prove up next month and in January, have written the local land officials if they cannot re-advertise and change the dates of proof to the middle of next summer. They have ten days after the time set in their notice for proof, in which to apply for re-advertisement, which can only be granted by giving a reasonable excuse for failing to appear.

After 38 weeks of meagre existence the Silver Lake Bulletin announces in its last issue its own death. The Examiner foretold the fearful result when the Bulletin budded into life, and can now be pardoned for using that stereotyped expression, "I told you so." Secretary Hitchcock may be responsible for this untimely death in withdrawing all of the timber land from settlement. Other deaths from the same cause may yet be recorded.

The marriage of Austin S. Hammond, the well-known attorney, and Miss Charity Maldonado, of Sellwood, near Portland, was announced to take place at the home of the bride, November 18th. The bride has been a stenographer in Mr. Hammond's employ for several years.
