

AARON VERLIN SMITH.

In his 69th year, death claims another old resident of Lake county. Aaron Verlin Smith died in Lakeview Sunday morning from a complication of diseases, resulting from stomach trouble, contracted during his three years' service in the civil war.

Mr. Smith was born in Ohio, September, 1834, moved to Kansas and came to Lake County, Oregon, in 1875. He has lived most of the time at New Pine Creek, until the last 10 years, which were spent at Silver Lake. He leaves two sons, J. A. and R. A. Smith, and a brother, who lives in Douglas county, this state.

The funeral was held at New Pine Creek Monday at noon. Rev. H. Smith preached the funeral sermon.

The City Council Meets.

The city council met in a regular session Tuesday night. The usual order of business was followed, bills allowed etc. Committees reported improvements of sidewalks, lights, etc. The appointment of city marshal was laid over. The city's indebtedness was shown to be about \$19,000 at the present time, not including accrued interest. The payment of warrants is two years and a month behind. Some means will be devised if possible to reduce this indebtedness at an early date as possible. J. A. Anthony was called upon to make a proposition to the town in regard to furnishing the lights to the town from New Pine Creek. He requested a day's time in which to figure, which was granted. The council then adjourned until Wednesday night.

A. B. Schroder, assisted by N. Waldo Taylor, took about 100 head of cattle to Pine lake this week for winter quarters.

Porter Bros. will drive about 400 head of cattle to Pine creek this week where they will feed them for the spring market.

C. C. Roe, who has been herding sheep for R. L. Sherlock for the past seven months, left Tuesday for Lakeview where he will spend the winter. Fred Pike of Paisley took his place as herder.

Chester Avery and G. H. Small who are driving about 400 head of beef cattle to Montague have prospective buyers and will no doubt soon make a sale.

J. W. Howard started a bunch of 500 beef cattle to market from Klamath Falls the first of the week. This is the second bunch that he has started from there and several more are to follow.

We are informed that S. A. D. Porter, who drove his cattle to Klamath Falls about two weeks ago, could make no sale there and drove them on to the railroad to be shipped to San Francisco where they will be butchered on commission. He was assisted in the drive by Ed Parks and E. G. Mobley.

J. R. Horning, W. C. Bulck and Wm. Owsley returned last week from Montague where they delivered 143 head of beef cattle which they sold to Poly, Hellburne & Co., of San Francisco, at 5 1/2 and 6 1/2. Mr. Horning informs us that he had opportunities to contract beef steers for January at 7 1/2. The cattle prospects are beginning to look better as there are now more buyers than a few weeks ago.
