JAMES A. WILLIAMS.

Again we are called upon to chronicle the death of an early and respected settler, James A. Williams died at the hot springs ranch two miles south of Lakeview, at 1 o'clock a. m., Saturday, Nov. 28th, 1903. Uncle Jim had been bedfast for several weeks with kidney and bladder trouble. Several surgical operations were performed upon him but his disease was too deepseated to prove successful. When it was announced to Uncle Jim that he was soon to die, his jocular disposition was not abashed in the least, and his happy frame of mind was only stilled when death came.

James Williams was born in Pike county, Missouri, Sept. 21st, 1831, and crossed the plains to California in 1856, settling in Sacramento county where his family have ever since resided. He came to Lake county in 1878, and located the Dunn's Cove ranch on the west side of Goose Lake. This place was afterward sold and he took up another in that vicinity, which he owned at his death.

His wife, who survives him, is 76 years of age. His only son, Frank L. Williams, arrived just 18 hours too late to see his father alive. Two step daughters are also survivors.

Uncle Jim made a will several days before he died, bequeathing all his property to his son. John Blair was appointed custodian of the estate without bonds, to pay all bills, and turn over the balance to his son. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, of which order he was a social member. The funeral was preached by Rev. J. B. Stark, at the M. E. church. A large procession followed the remains to the grave.

Uncle Jim was one of the pioneer men who shed their influence over the rough life of early days. He leaves a multitude of friends who will ever remember him as one who always tried to do what was right and honest, and carried this program out during his life. May he rest in peace.
