E. H. Gibbins Dies.

After a severe and lingering illness E. H. Gibbins, the New Pine Creek merchant, finally succumbed to that dread disease, typhoid pneumonia. Death, while not unexpected, came as a shock to his family and friends Sunday morning.

Mr. Gibbins has been a resident of Modoc county for many years, and moved to New Pine Creek, several years ago and went into partnership with Edw. Hartzog in the mercantile business, which was being carried on at the time of his death. He was 45 years and ten months old, and leaves a wife and four children to mourn their sad and irriparable loss.

The funeral took place at New Pine Creek Monday under the auspices of the A. O. U. W. lodge, of which society he was a member. Rev. Smith preached the funeral, and a large concourse followed the remains to the grave.
