**Rubber From Sage Brush.**

Some years ago Thomas Edison, while in this country, remarked that God never made anything in nature that was not of use, and he believed that the vast tracts of sagebrush in Nevada would some day be turned to a great commercial value.

In this connection the following dispatch from Denver is of interest. It is taken from the New York Times:

The first carload of "Actinella Richardson," an unsightly sagebrush which covers thousands of acres of mountainous country in Southern Colorado, was delivered today to the Western Rubber Company recently incorporated, and which expects to revolutionize the rubber industry.

It was discovered not long ago that the supposed useless "rabbit brush" which covers the mountains at an altitude of 7000 to 9000 feet, contained 25 per cent commercial rubber.

A prospector lost in the hills first discovered the rubber substance by chewing the root to sustain life. His discovery was brought to the knowledge of Chicago chemists, and the Western Rubber Company was the result.

A dozen men are now engaged on the hills about Salida, collecting the brush of which millions of tons are in sight. Rubber that has stood all the tests of the tropical product has been manufactured on a small scale and the organizers of the Western Rubber Company announce that they are prepared to install a large factory.

There is a good deal of meat in the above and if their experiment is successful, it means the inauguration of big rubber enterprises in Nevada. We have enough material here to make rubber for the world. Rubber is increasing in value of late from the great scarcity of the article.

Sagebrush also produces the best tannin oil in the world and the two manufacturing enterprises could easily be combined.

**Stock Notes.**

Caleb T. Oliver, of Merrill, and C. O. Stanton, of Iowa, were in the city Tuesday. Mr. Stanton recently delivered a carload of blooded horses to Mr. Oliver, who will deal more extensively than ever in the raising of blooded stock. The horses are now in Montague, but will be in Klamath Falls during the holidays for the inspection of all admirers of fine stock. Mr. Oliver has been successful in stock raising, and deservedly so, for he is of the county's enterprising citizens. He is interested in the county's progress and welfare. He has been awarded more premiums for exhibits at the county fairs than any other exhibitor.

S. L. Aiken, cattle buyer for the Western Meat Co., of San Francisco, started 400 head of beef cattle for the railroad this week. They were selected from the Howard band of 2500 head he purchased last fall and which is being wintered here. Mr. Aiken is the largest purchaser of cattle that visits this section. He covers territory from Texas to Montana and westward, and at the present time is feeding 10,000 head of cattle in Nevada, where alfalfa is perfection and where it is properly fed. The alfalfa grown here, he says, is far superior to the Shasta valley product and probably equals that of Nevada, which he will be able to determine when those who handle it acquire the proper mode of feeding. Klamath is an ideal section for feed yards, Mr. Aiken said, and is so destined for the livestock of all the contiguous country for many miles around, it being easily accessible to railroad facilities.

Frank Caldwell returned from San Francisco last Thursday where he had been for about a month. Mr. Caldwell took down about 200 head of beef about a month ago and had them killed on commission. He says some of the steers brought him over 7 cents while some of the poorest cows brought about 3 cents.

Nothing short of this will be satisfactory to the residents of this section. No land that scrip has been issued in lieu of, is as valuable as timber land, and the Government gets the worst of it every time scrip is placed on timber land. The only way that Uncle Sam and the communities surrounding the land can be benefitted, is for only bonafide settlers to take up the land. Scrip not only deprives the honest settlers from his rights, but the county in which the timber is located derives no benefit whatever when scrippers take it up. Every timber claim taken up by an individual brings to the county from \$25 to \$100, and everybody is directly or indirectly benefitted.
