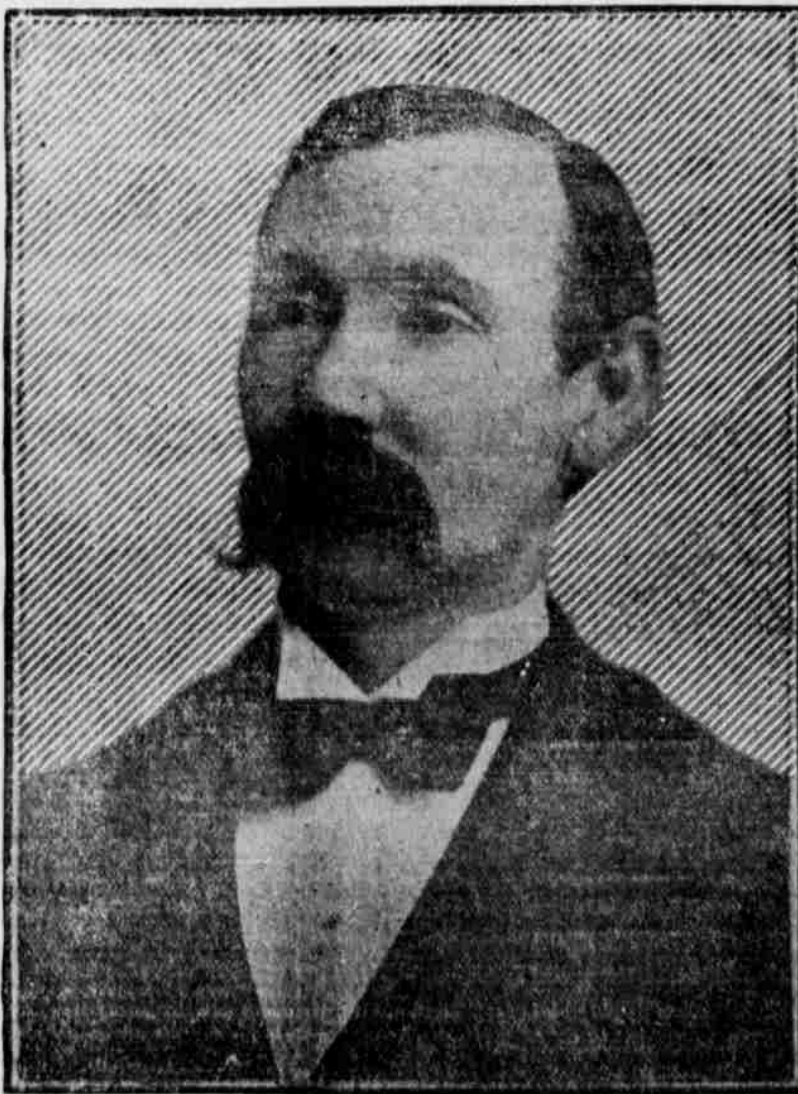

RESOLUTION OFFERED

At a Special Meeting of The City Council Last Week Lighting Matters Were Discussed.

Mayor Heryford called a special meeting of the city council Wednesday night last week to hear the report of the committee composed of Councilmen Bailey and Reynolds, who were appointed to arrange the details in a contract with J. A. Anthony to furnish electric current over his line from New Pine Creek to light Lakeview. The committee reported by producing a resolution and contract which was read and explained by their legal advisor J. A. Boggs.

Following is the resolution: "Whereas, James A. Anthony of Modoc County, State of California, has proposed to The Town of Lakeview, that he will furnish and supply the said town and its inhabitants, for a period of ten years from and after the 1st day of February, 1904, with a good, sufficient and continuous electric current for lights within the said town, both for public and private use, during the hours when lights are necessary, for and in consideration of the following rates per candle power, and the following flat rates, to-wit:

Three cents per candle power for each candle power used in "all night lights."

Two and one-half cents per candle power for each candle power used in lights burned, not later than ten o'clock p. m.

One and one-quarter cents per candle power for each candle power used in lights burned in kitchens and bedrooms.

Fifty cents per month for all electric current used in all lights burned in lighting any church.

Two dollars per month for all electric current used in all lights burned in lighting the Masonic Hall.

One dollar and twenty-five cents per month for all electric current used in all lights burned in lighting the Odd Fellows Hall.

Two dollars and fifty cents per month for all electric current used in all lights burned in lighting Barry's Hall.

All such electric current to be used within the corporate limits of said Town of Lakeview, and for lighting purposes only.

Resolved: That the Mayor and Recorder of the Town of Lakeview be and are hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf of the said Town of Lakeview, to enter into an agreement, in duplicate, with the said James A. Anthony, in accordance with the foregoing proposition; said agreement shall be in the following form and read as follows, to-wit:

Here follows the agreement in full. "And be it further Resolved, that the said agreement be not delivered by the said Mayor and Recorder to the said James A. Anthony until the said Anthony shall furnish to the said Town of Lakeview a good and sufficient bond, executed by the said Anthony and at least two sureties, and accepted by the common council of the said Town of Lakeview; which said bond shall be conditioned that the said Anthony shall pay all monies, and shall well and truly keep and perform any and all the terms and conditions, as stated in said agreement to be by him kept and performed; and further conditioned that in case the said Anthony fail, neglect or refuse to make any such payment, or keep or perform any of such terms or conditions, as stated in said agreement to be by him kept and performed, then and that case the said bondsmen, individually or collectively, shall pay to the said Town of Lakeview the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to cover any and all such defaulted payments and to reimburse said Town of Lakeview for any and all damages resulting to the said Town of Lakeview as a result of such failure, neglect or refusal of the said Anthony to keep or perform any of the terms or conditions stated in said agreement to be kept and performed by the said Anthony."

A resolution was also read which is to lease the city dynamo to Mr. Anthony for a term of one year at the rate of \$10 per month rental. Both resolutions were laid on the table until the next regular meeting, Jan. 5th, when they will be brought up and voted on. No business was transacted during the meeting of the council.

Much interest is being manifest in the prospect of a deal with Mr. Anthony, as it is realized that a big saving for the town will be made.

Ashland Goes Dry Again.

At the annual election held in Ashland on Dec. 15th, a majority of 24 voters declared for a "dry town" the vote being 282 for license and 306 against.

H. S. Evans, Citizens' nominee for Mayor was elected by 59 majority over R. P. Neil, the Anti-Saloon League candidate, with D. A. Applegate, the Republican nominee, third in the race.

SAGEHEN MINES AGAIN

Captain Johnson Makes Examination for a Wealthy Mining Firm Who Mean Business

The Sagehen mines, located 15 miles east of Lakeview, which have caused several excitements upon the report that gold had been discovered there in endless quantities, then again prove to be worthless, are again to know their fate.

Captain J. Sub Johnson, E. M., Metallurgist and assayer of Visalia, Cal., representing some California millionaire mining men, arrived here Saturday to investigate the Sagehen mines. Messrs. Hughes and Weisner last summer located eight claims in that vicinity and took some specimens which looked good to the big mining men, and the assay that they made went about \$7.85 in gold and silver. They at once bonded the claims and sent their expert to view the ground and make a report. Mr. Johnson assayed one piece of rock before he went to the mines that he found in town which did not give a trace of gold.

Mr. Johnson went over Monday and will make a thorough examination of that section and may go to Paisley to examine the mines there before he returns home. Should his report substantiate that of Hughes and Weisner, the company will put up a large smelter on Deep Creek. Even should the rock only go as high as \$3.50 the company would feel justified in putting in the smelter.

At this writing Mr. Johnson had not returned from Sagehen, but he was expected last night. His report will be awaited with much anxiety by the people of this county, as the discovery of gold so near Lakeview means much toward the development of the county.

LATER—Capt. Johnson returned yesterday, having gone over the entire field and secured forty samples of rock from the surface and many prospect holes, averaging in depth from a few feet to 35 feet. He says that should the mines prove as represented to him, there is a claim there for every man in Lakeview, and that there is no choice. He will assay the rock when he returns home.
