There is no place in the world where any man, high or low, with or without education, has a better opportunity to build up a small fortune. The resources of this county is the stock industry. Time and again young men have started with nothing but their hands to work with, and at the end of 5 or 6 years, sold out and left the county or gone into other business with from \$3,000 to \$8,000. The list of taxpayers in Lake county who pay on less than \$1000 is greater than those who pay over that amount. There is a reward for those who are willing to work and know how to save.

Dame Rumor is now circulating a report in Alturas that another newspaper or two were to be started there. Oh, well there is nothing else much to talk about this winter weather, and the rumor may reach Lakeview before spring. A Futurity Colt Race.

There will be a great colt race to be run over the new Bonanza race course some time early next summer, the exact date not having yet been named.
