Additional Local

Hon. H. W. Scott, editor of the "Morning Oregonian" is said to be a candidate for appointment as the Pacific Coast member of the Isthmian Canal Commission, at the hands of President Roosevelt.—Ashland Tidings.

Richard Hutchinson, a pioneer resident of Southern Oregon and a resident of Klamath county for over a quarter of a century, died at his home at Redlands, Cal., Dec. 13th, aged 78 years, and was buried at Ashland. He took part in the Modoc war.

W. W. Scott, special agent of the Interior Department, accompanied by his wife and child, arrived here on the 16th from Kansas. Mr. Scott is here to assist Mr. Jones in the extra volume of business that is to come up before the land office during the next three months.

The Oregon Legislature convened in special session last Monday afternoon pursuant to call of Governor Chamberlain. Before this issue of the Examiner reaches its readers no doubt that august body will have enacted a tax law that will be effective for some time to come.

Sheriff Dunlap returned last night with W. R. Miller, whom he went to Plush to arrest for selling liquor without a license. As stated in last week's Examiner Miller had started for Idaho, and had three days' start of the sheriff. He was apprehended near the state line. He will have his examination today.

As a result of a recent contest over swamp land in Southern Oregon, east of the Cascades, in which contest there was much evidence of keen rivalry over the right to purchase, the State Land Board has adopted a new rule, ordering that hereafter all sales of unsurveyed swamp land be made to the highest bidder. Sales will be made after 90 day's advertisement in the newspapers.

A variety of weather, the past week (mostly winter weather) has been the portion of Lake county. First, a little snow and a little blow, then some more snow and then a thaw. A freeze follows and then a fog descends and during the night covers everything with a white mantle of frost beautiful to behold.

Walter Sherlock went to Modoc county last week where he took a bunch of mutton sheep belonging to Ches. Parker, to San Francisco to be butchered. Mrs. Sherlock received a telegram from her husband at Reno to meet him there and go to San Francisco to spend the holidays. She started on the southern stage yesterday morning.

Wm McKay arrived Monday from Madeline with a load of freight for Lakeview merchants, in the lot was 1800 pounds of newspaper for The Examiner. The freight amounted to \$27 for the teamster, and \$31.72 for the railroad, making a total of \$58.72 for freight alone. The original cost of the paper was 4 cents per pound, or \$72, making the lot of paper cost the small sum of \$130.72 which must be met several times a year, yet there are people who think it costs nothing to run a newspaper. And this too, is a mere item compared to other expenses.

The transfer of the mail for Klamath and Lake counties to the new Klamath river railroad from Lairds on January 1st as announced, will probably result in the revocation of the present contract over the Klamath Falls-Ashland route and the substitution of a new service from this city to supply the postoffices between here and Pokegema says the Ashland Tidings. The patrons of the Barron, Soda Springs, and Shake postoffices have so long been accustomed to daily mail and the service is of so much importance that they will not be satisfied with any reduced service and an effort will be made to secure a daily mail over the shortened route.

Groundhog on the Market.

E. C. Thruston was in from his Goose Lake farm Monday peddling out some groundhog that he had killed recently. Groundhog is the same to a Lake countyite as the possum is to the Southern negro, especially in the winter season.
