TIME TO MOVE.

It is understood that Forestry Inspectors who have been looking over the temporary withdrawal in Lake county will recommend in their reports that the reserve be made permanent as it now stands. This will be the rankest sort of injustice to Lake county, and will blight the future prospects of the county to such an extent as to entirely prohibit settlers from coming here.

The most rabid sympathizers of forest reserves in Lake county would rather have no reserve at all, than have the whole county set aside as it is now. The largest reserve in the State is in Lake county. If the reserve was confirmed to timber land alone, hardly more than half the present acreage would be included.

Not only should the open grazing and agricultural land be thrown open for settlement, but the greater portion of the timber land should not be included in a reserve, if any reserve is made. The people of Lake county should make a more vigorous protest, or else the whole county will be made into a reserve. If we sit still and do or say nothing, the department will take it from the recommendations that the people are in favor of it, and when once the reserve is made, it will be close to impossible to have any portion of it opened again. The time to do something has arrived, and if it is put off it may be too late.

Asks Congress For Appropriation.

The Senate of the Oregon Legislature on the first day of the special session adopted by unanimous vote a joint memorial asking Congress to enact the bill now pending in Congress appropriating \$2,125,000 for the aid of the Lewis & Clark Exposition. The adoption of this memorial was the first work of the Senate after perfecting an organization. The memorial was introduced by President George C. Brownell.

The memorial cites the historical, industrial and commercial significance of the Fair; reviews the growth of the Northwest country in the past 100 years; sets forth the work that has already been accomplished for the Exposition; shows that Oregon and other states have provided exhibits worth \$1,000,000; calls the attention of Congress to the bill now before that body to appropriate \$2,125,000 for the fair and urges that sum as the proper amount to give to the project.

Fulton's Maiden Speech.

In his maiden speech covering half an hour last week, Senator Fulton made an eloquent appeal to the United States Government for government aid for the Lewis & Clark Exposition. His speech was delivered in an off-hand manner and its pleasing style appealed to the Senators on the floor and to the well-filled galleries and won for him hearty congratulations from his fellow senators. His appeal for appropriation was on two grounds—that the Pacific coast has never had a recommendation of this sort, and that the event whose anniversary is to be commemorated was of such historical importance as to demand recognition by the Congress.

MASQUERADE A SUCCESS

Over Sixty Maskers Take Merry and a Large Crowd of Spectators Enjoy the Scene.

The masquerade ball given by Graham's Concert Band was a greater success than the boys anticipated. The names of 63 maskers were taken at the door, but they came in so fast that many came in without giving their names.

All the costumes were home made and there were some fine ones, but the best sustained characters were cheaply made.
