NOT TOO EARLY, MAYBE TOO LATE.

The following editorial from the Deschutes Echo, published at the little town of Deschutes, in the big timber belt, would indicate that no fear is entertained that any of the reserves of Oregon will be made permanent.

"The Lakeview Examiner takes a somewhat pessimistic view of what the outcome of the inspection of the recent withdrawal might be. It states in its last issue that the inspectors who have been going over the withdrawal area will recommend that the lands be reserved permanently. This, of course, would work an immeasurable hardship on the people of Lake county and would also have a detrimental effect on this county. It is impossible to ascertain the grounds on which such a recommendation would be based and we are inclined that the Examiner has begun very early to shed a few unnecessary tears."

Possibly the people of the Deschutes country are not aware that special forestry agent Roth who investigated the Warner Mountain withdrawal in this county and Modoc county, Cal., told every farmer and stockman that he met the advantages to be derived from a reserve. And we understand that probably eight out of every ten men who were originally against the wholesale reserve grab, were made to believe as Roth told them. Consequently it is no idle dream to suppose that the inspectors now in the field will recommend that the withdrawals be made permanent as they now stand, inasmuch as they were made to know the wishes of the people through the report of Roth.

It has also come to The Examiner (the truth of which we cannot at present verify) that the gentlemen now in the field have asserted as much as first reported in these columns.

The majority of the people of Lake county, while they are now beginning to believe that a permanent reserve would do the greatest injury to the county of anything that could be done, only a few have taken interest enough to fight it and lay the matter before our representatives in Congress. We haven't the slightest doubt but nine-tenths of the people of this county would be more than glad to see the present withdrawal (with the exception of a few sections at water sources) thrown open to the public. Yet they sit idly by and expect it to be done without making a move on their part, or without knowing who is taking the initiative. They are content to know that the matter is being agitated in the newspapers, and that our Senators and Congressmen are doing what they can to have the reserves opened.

Unless the newspapers of the county continue to agitate and finally arouse the people from their lethargic state, the department of the Interior can take no other view than we are all for a reserve.

WHO'L START THE LAUNDRY.

The New Era is agitating the establishing of a steam laundry at Alturas, and in support of its argument says:

"One of the greatest needs of this town at present is the establishment of a steam laundry, and we can truthfully say that it would be one of the best paying institutions that

could be established. Hardly a family in town but that would patronize it, and be glad to do so."

What is true of the needs of our sister town to the south, is also true of Lakeview, and the laundry business has often been exploited in these columns. No one doubts but what it would pay, and all are a unit as to giving it support. The mere fact that it has been attempted several times on a small scale and failed, has undoubtedly "queered" any one from making the attempt again.

If the steam laundry at Reno can lay our laundry down in Lakeview after paying the express on it both ways, or 350 miles, at half what the opium-smoking heathen does it right here for, surely there is something in the laundry business. But it is not the price that the people are kicking about. When their laundry comes back worn out and so dirty that it would make the chief of the Cannibal Islands ashamed to wear even one cuff on his ankle, then it is when the blue flames of wrath melts the snow for ten feet around the enraged person.

Yes, a steam laundry is badly needed, but there are many other things we don't need, that we'll probably get before we will see a steam laundry started in this neighborhood.
