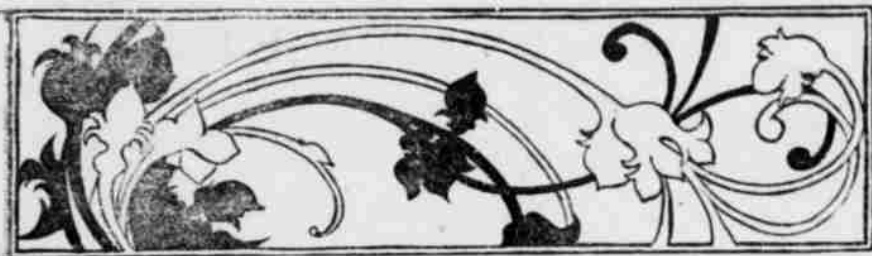

THREE MORE CHARGES

For Selling Whiskey at Plush W. Scammon Gives Bonds to Appear in Circuit Court.

Upon warrants issued out of Justice Bayley's court, Willis Scammon of Plush appeared Wednesday, Jan. 13th, and waived examination on three charges for selling liquor without a license at Plush. The first was on an information filed by D. U. Cleland, and bail was fixed at \$250, which was readily furnished. Two other informations were filed, one by John B. Wise and the other by Geo. P. Boone. Bail was fixed at \$100 in each case, to appear at the next term of circuit court.

This makes the fourth charge against Mr. Scammon for this offense, one having been heard last month.

It is understood that Mr. Scammon says that he will quit selling liquor now, and will devote his attention to his store business. He does not wish to be brought over to Lakeview any more for the offense he is charged with.

The people who are causing Mr. Scammon to be prosecuted claim that is all they want. If the liquor traffic is stopped in the Plush town, the serenity of the berg will not be disturbed, and all will be peace and quiet.
