

PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COURT.

March 2nd 1904.

Be it remembered that at a regular term of the County Court of the County of Lake and State of Oregon begun and held at the Court House in Lakeview on the 8th day of March 1904 at which were present Hon. B. Daly, Judge; Hon. S. J. Prose, Commissioner; Hon. W. A. Currier, Commissioner; H. R. Dunlap, Sheriff; and A. W. Manning, Clerk when the following proceedings were had to-wit:

Court adjourned until Thursday March 3d at 10 o'clock A. M.

Court convened pursuant to adjournment of March 2nd, the same officers being present when the following proceedings were had to-wit:

Mr. A. G. Geyer having failed to qualify as Road Supervisor of Dist. No. 1. It is hereby ordered that George Parker be appointed as Road Supervisor of said district.

Owing to the great damage done to the County roads of Lake County by the recent storms, the Road Supervisors of the County are urged to repair said roads as soon as possible, and that all such repairs be made in a substantial way so that the County may have good permanent public highways. In order to ascertain the condition of the roads, culverts and bridges of the County it is hereby ordered that an inspection of the same be made by the County Court or some member thereof and a report of such inspection be filed at the next session of said Court.

For the purpose of making prompt repairs of said roads the following appropriation is hereby made and the Clerk is hereby instructed to draw warrants on the Road Fund as follows:

Additional Local

Government Stock Inspector J. A. Smith visited J. M. Thompson's sheep camp last week, which is located in Nevada east of Cedarville. On his way over Fandango pass he experienced some very deep snow, being compelled to walk and lead his horse over the mountain.

T. H. Cloud and wife, who spent the winter in the Sacramento valley, returned to New Pine Creek last week. Mr. Cloud is in Lakeview this week looking for a location for his soda works. The new National Bank will be erected on the site now occupied by the soda factory.

While preparing to pursue the horse thief that stole C. M. Innes' saddle horse at Summer Lake, Charley Campbell accidentally shot himself through the leg at his home in Paisley Tuesday night. He was buckling on the holster when the pistol was discharged. No particulars were learned.

Petitions are signed to change the mail between Paisley and Silver Lake from a day to a night service. The former change would delay the mail, while a night service from here to Paisley would give them a morning mail and 12 hours earlier than now. The Examiner hopes that the latter change may be effected.

The manuscript for a 35-page pamphlet, entitled "Forest Wealth of Oregon," which was authorized by the Lewis and Clark Fair commission is in the hands of the state printer. It will contain four illustrations and a fly leaf advertising the Lewis and Clark exposition. Fifteen thousand copies were ordered. It will be distributed at St. Louis from the Oregon forestry exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase exposition.

Jonas Norin returned from a visit to his sheep camp on the desert last Thursday. His sheep are not many miles from the vicinity in which McCune's band of 2000 were slaughtered. Jonas became lost in a blizzard when near his camp and was out 40 hours without food or shelter and was nearly perished when the storm cleared sufficiently to disclose and old cabin in close proximity in which he found some skins to wrap himself in. Jonas reports the sheep in that section quite thin but he thinks they will pull through, as the grass is starting in good shape. So far there has been very little loss, but it is not too late yet for a heavy loss.

John M. Sanders, a pioneer of Surprise valley, died at Ft. Bidwell Sunday, Feb. 28th. For a number of years he has been post master at that place, and held that position at the time of his death. He was a native of Iowa and was 72 years old. The Bidwell Lodge of Odd Fellows laid him to rest. Two daughters survive him.

Walter Sherlock says the high water has done much damage every place he has been since he left San Francisco. He and wife just crossed the Pitt river bridge at Alturas a short time before it was washed out by the flood. Every creek in Goose Lake valley were out of their banks, and the Willow creek bridge at Willow Ranch has been washed out.

Word was received here Monday that the two smallest reservoirs built last summer by W. T. Cressler at his Guano ranch had been broken by the heavy rush of water last week and are probably partially or wholly destroyed says the Cedarville Record. They seemed to hold back large bodies of water, which the waste gates evidently could not carry away, hence the washout.

The following gentlemen came over from Ft. Bidwell last Friday: Rufus Ward, Henry Stephens, D. M. Miller, Fred Ash and I. C. Raymond. They all came over to attend a meeting of Lakeview Encampment, I. O. O. F., of which order they are members except the latter two, and they were initiated into the mysteries that night. An oyster supper at Harvey's restaurant at midnight was the climax to a very entertaining evening.

Sheriff Shutt of Morrow county has sold only four small tracts of land to satisfy a balance of \$20.82 which remained on the 1902 tax roll uncollected. Out of \$63,000 charged against the sheriff on the 1902 tax roll, he has now collected every cent and all but the trifling sum of \$20.82 was collected without the sale of property. Only one other county in the state, Lake, can beat this record. It is the best showing Morrow county has ever made.

President to Get \$75,000.

Senator Gallinger introduced a bill in Congress last week increasing the salaries of executive officers of the Government and also of Senators and members of the House of Representatives. The bill fixes the following scale:

President, \$75,000; Vice-President, \$15,000; Speaker of the House of Representatives, \$12,000; members of the Cabinet, \$15,000 each; Senators and members of the House, \$8000 each. The bill provides that the new salaries shall take effect March 4, 1905.
