The Republican State Central Committee has given out that the Republican State Convention will be held in Portland on Thursday, April 14, 1904, at 10 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of nominating candidates for one supreme Judge for a period of six years, one Dairy and Food Commissioner for a period of four years; four Presidential electors to be voted for in November; Circuit Judges and District Attorneys for judicial districts of the state for the term of six years and four years respectively, joint representatives and Senators for the various districts. Also four delegates to the National convention, to nominate a candidate for President of the United States. There will be in the convention from all the counties in the state 361 delegates. Lake county will have four.

President Roosevelt has reconsidered the order recently issued upon recommendations made by Senator Heyburn, of Idaho, that no more forest reserves be created without first consulting the Senators and representatives from the states interested. It was advised that such an order, if carried out, would make it possible for land grabbers to become acquainted with intended withdrawals, and profit by them. It is likely, however, that the president will modify his order, and direct that hereafter no permanent forest reserves be created until the delegation from the state where the land is located has been consulted.
