The Chinese exclusion laws are to prohibit immigration of the celestials, so says Attorney General Knox regardless of the expiration of the treaty between the United States and China signed in 1894 and to be in force 20 years or to expire December 7, 1904, providing either nation so desired. China declared the treaty to an end with the hope of forming a new treaty that would be more favorable to Chinese entering the United States. With this view the present session of congress was moved to enact an equally prohibitive law in case the attorney general decided the old exclusion law would not be effective.

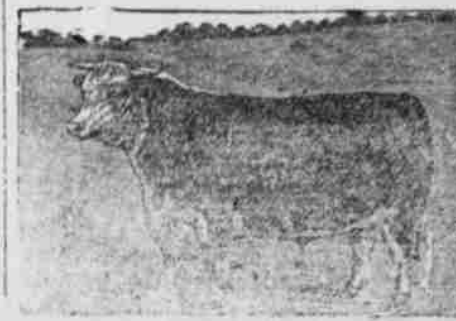
