One of the best suggestions made lately in the interests of honesty in public affairs is the proposition of the Federal land office at Washington, to provide its agents when sent out on inspecting tours with cameras with which to take photographs of improvements alleged to have been made on homesteads, timber and stone entries and different kinds of land taken by settlers—and others.

Many contested cases could be easily settled by the pictures of "improvements" which are claimed to be sufficient within the law. In fact, it would be a good idea to incorporate this requirement in the final proof submitted by land claimants. A photograph would be an unanswerable witness in many of the cases where other testimony is contradictory and insufficient.—Salem Statesman.

#### Hunt's Wool for Living.

The Umatilla Indians care more industriously than a great many tribes of Western Indians. While the avocations of those who do not till the soil on the reservation or indulge in any particular pursuits are similar in nature to our Plate Indians, their energy is more apparent. As soon as spring comes the Umatilla Indians of a roving nature skip out for the foothills in the vicinity of the winter sheep ranges, where the squaws pick wool from the dead sheep and from the brush where locks of wool have been pulled from the traveling sheep, while the lone Indians hunt for game and provide the food. When they get enough to load their ponies they go to the towns where they dispose of the wool at about 8 cents a pound. They sometimes pack the wool 100 to 150 miles on their ponies to market.
