After the snow last week, which accumulated to the depth of about four inches, the weather turned cold, and last Friday night the thermometer registered 10 degrees above zero, the coldest night since January.

Several drummers arrived in Lakeview during the past week on their semi-annual trips. Lakeview is considered the best town in the interior by commercial travelers and they all make a rush for Lakeview as soon as the roads are open in the spring.

Day Drive, Says "Alqua".

The Chewaucan Post of April 21, contains a long article headed, "Petition Was Sent In." The article was written by a stranger, Mr. Sain, which is probably the reason it contains so many errors. First implied error is, "the petition contained many signers." The facts are it contained the names of all the patrons along the route except Mr. Sain and Mr. Harvey, the only persons who get their mail before morning. Second error is "the change is purely in the interest of the carrier and postmaster at Summer Lake." The people along this route are from ten to twenty miles from stores and blacksmith shops, and depend upon the mail carrier to do innumerable errands for them, getting machinery repaired, or new parts, and supplies, saving them long journeys and great loss of time. Further the people of Summer Lake are large exporters of fruits and vegetables by stage, and a night schedule requires valuable boxes of fruits to be left by the road side, not a very safe place, so the driver can get them, and all wants of the people have to be written and many often left in letters in their boxes, all of which the people say they could attend to much more conveniently if they had a day schedule. In fact they say the time of the delivery of their mail is of the least importance to them. Again Mr. Sain feels so badly because the people of Summer Lake would not get their mail for Sunday reading. He says by the present schedule the Lakeview Saturday mail reaches Summer Lake that night and people have their mail for Sunday. Mr. Sain ought to study the schedule a little better, then he would not be thus troubled, indeed a change to a day schedule is what he ought to work for if he wants the people to have their mail for Sunday. By the present summer schedule the mail does not leave Paisley Saturday night, but lies there until Sunday night, and patrons get it Monday, but a day schedule would take it out Saturday morning and people would have it for Sunday reading. Mr. Sain says it would be very unjust to force a night schedule on a carrier, but this is just what he is trying to force on Mr. Bryan by changing the day schedule from Lakeview to Paisley, to a night one. This change would bring our southern mail 12 hours earlier, but our western mail would have to lie there all day. A change in the schedule from Paisley north to a day drive would not effect the arrival of the mail at Paisley, and would enable tourists to see the great Borax works at Summer Lake. The patrons at the far end of the line, Silver Lake are the only ones that would be inconvenienced, and the only ones that ought to object. The writer remembers when the Lakeview mail used to arrive in Paisley shortly after noon and was carried on to Summer Lake the same day, but we took a backward step and gave contractors more time and no great calamity has befallen the country on account of it. The pioneers, home builders of this country, were not aware that they ought to consult Mr. Sain about matters that concern themselves alone.
